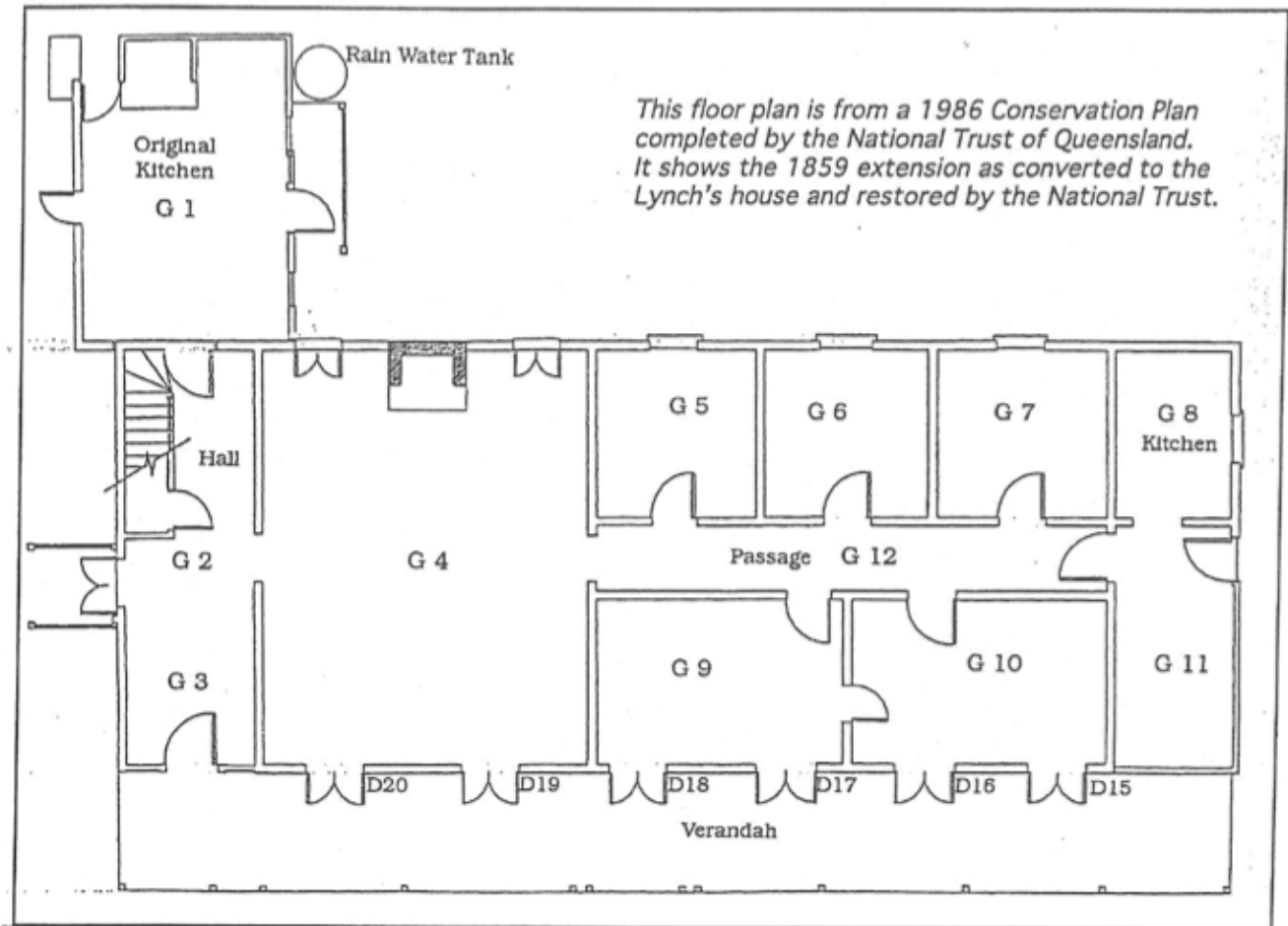


Site visit worksheet Year 5



Kitchen

Find the original kitchen (which is the only surviving part of the 1847 inn), marked as G1 on the plan, and answer the following questions:

Why might the kitchen originally have been built as a separate but adjoining building?

Which object in the kitchen is the closest piece of equipment to a modern fridge? Describe what it looks like and how it worked.

How did the stove work? What were some disadvantages of cooking with this stove?

Write down three objects in the kitchen that you do not have in your own kitchen.

Find the rooms marked G9 and G10 on the plan. Look underneath the bed. What was the white china object used for?

Find William Horton's wedding present from his father-in-law, and write down what it was used for. Why would this have been a useful present? (Remember! No telephones, no email!)

Locate the room marked G4, which is the largest room on the ground floor. What do you think its function was?

Look at the doors marked D15 to D20 on the plan. What reason did William Horton have for putting all these double doors (known as French doors) along the front of the building?
