

### **EDITORIAL**

Since the last Bulletin the Trust has been able to air its voice and opinion on a number of heritage issues in Canberra. Council decided that we must assume a visible profile on heritage matters and it was agreed that we would issue press statements as appropriate issues come into public notice.

The Canberra Times ran a prominent press release under the title "National Trust Wants to Save Barton House" and 2CN Radio news included an interview. The issue was the proposed demolition of 37 Telopea Park West, Barton, in an area Classified by the Trust eight years ago. This part of Barton is historically important as an intact example of the garden city concept which influenced Canberra's early development.

In the continuing controversy on the extent of development by the Hooker corporation at the Canberra Brickworks, the Canberra Times referred to the Trust's concern that heritage and environmental matters had not received adequate attention and that the views of concerned community groups had not been fully heard.


A further press release highlighting the heritage significance of the Civic Olympic Pool complex has also been featured in the Canberra Times to add weight to the views expressed at a rally on the amenity value of the Pool. The Pool complex is an important 1950's building, having been awarded the John Sulman Prize for Architecture in 1958. It is Classified by the National Trust and is on the Royal Australian Institute of Architects Register of Significant 20th Century Architecture. I have also responded to Senator Margaret Reid's concerns on the proposal to build a Child Care Centre in the gardens of the Provisional Parliament House. 2CN Radio news included interview comments to the effect that the Trust considered that heritage groups in Canberra should have been consulted at the outset of the proposal in view of the national heritage significance of the building and its surrounds. The Australian Heritage Commission and the Australian Council of National Trusts have made the same comment. The Trust does not oppose the idea of a centre, but is concerned at heritage implication of the siting.

The Antique Fair during Canberra Week was a splendid success and warmest congratulations go to all those helped in the arrangements

and smooth running. Our next major function is the Founders' Day Dinner at the Hyatt Hotel Canberra; we have an excellent speaker - Dr John Ritchie and the evening promises to be most enjoyable.

# MARBLE ARCH BUSHWALK - Sunday 7 May 1989


Remarkably, it seems, five years have passed since the Trust's last expedition to the Big Hole and the Marble Arch. The former is a quite stunning natural feature approximately 100km south-east of Canberra. The Marble Arch is nearby and is a small valley with exposed pink marble.

The total walk is about 12km but some participants may prefer to settle for the first part of the walk to the Big Hole (about 5km return). You will need to traverse about 20km of gravel road and wade across a shallow section of the Shoalhaven River. You will also need to carry your own picnic lunch, but a wine and cheese party is included in the ticket price for those who survive to the end. All walking is along made tracks and only reasonable fitness is required. Non-members welcome.

### PANCAKES IN THE PARK - Sunday 21 May 1989

In the light of recent media attention focussed on Barton, and of public concern over the development of parts of Canberra's original suburbs, this activity aims to give members and their friends a better look at one of our first and best preserved areas — a walk through the Barton Urban Conservation Area (Trust Classified in 1980). Participants will meet in Telopea Park at 12.30 on Sunday 21 May 1989. The walk will commence with a talk on the plantings and landscaping of Telopea Park and of the general Barton area. The walk will then proceed to the Manuka Pool, Telopea Park School, the Methodist (now Uniting) Church, Brassey House and Barton Court (Tudor style flats designed by Ken Oliphant). Members will then walk through residential Barton (highlight includes an inspection of a Federation style home) to the Kingston Power House where, hopefully, a representative from the Electricity Authority will give us a guided tour.

Delicious sweet pancakes (choice of Bavarian Apple or Hot Buttered Walnuts) and tea and coffee will be served in Telopea Park at the conclusion of the tour. Cost: Members \$12.00; Non-members \$14.00; Young Trust \$10.00. Application form included in this newsletter. Numbers limited to 30. Participants are advised to dress sensibly for the weather at the time (it may be quite chilly/windy) and wear comfortable walking shoes. Participants will receive a programme giving further details closer to the date of the walk.
