EDITORIAL

The enclosed Appeal for donations to establish the "SAVE OUR HERITAGE FUND" is confirmation of the Trust's resolve to resist further assaults on the ACT's heritage.

The approved demolition of No. 37 Telopea Park West is not the first, and will certainly not be the last, attempt to subordinate public interest to private gain.

The construction of four aged person units at No. 37 has been promoted by the same developer who demolished No.10 Murray Crescent. Whilst the replacement units on that site include some of the stylistic features of the Federation house they replace, the density of development speaks for itself.

None of the few urban conservation areas that the Trust seeks to conserve can hope to retain their unique "garden city" character and integrity if subject to such pressures.

The wider extent of that loss is addressed in the letter below, prepared by Ken Taylor and myself, which was paraphrased in the Canberra Times on 16 May 1989.

As explained therein, the Trust is not opposed to development or change. It is surely not unreasonable, however, to seek to conserve, for the enrichment of our city and for the benefit of future generations, that very small percentage of our total built environment which best portrays Canberra's unique origins.

Given the inflated property values that heritage status now confers, this could hardly cause economic hardship to owners who (continued over)

need to relocate or change their lifestyle. It simply means that developers must confine their interest to the remaining 99% of Canberra.

At No. 37, one party's gain has denied other Barton residents their rights to the environment they cherish. That loss is also your loss!

Only with the support for the Appeal, your continued support for the Trust and your personal agitation will help bring about the heritage protection legislation that the ACT currently lacks and which, so obviously, it now requires.

BARTON HERITAGE

Trust Members will be aware of the proposed demolition of a house at Barton. The following letter to the Canberra Times (15/5/89) summarises the Trust's view and reasons for pressing for the protection of the house.

"Barton Heritage

The National Trust of Australia (ACT) is not without sympathy for the dilemma facing Mr & Mrs Gallagher over the proposed demolition of 37 Telopea Park West. However, the real issue is the retention for future generations of one of Canberra's finest examples of 1920's Garden City planning. This style of planning, with examples in small precincts in Reid, Forrest and Ainslie, is one of Canberra's special contributions to Australian planning. The charming style of the Federal Capital Commission architecture is particular to Canberra. It is complemented by street layout, street tree planting, garden styles, street furniture. The whole ambience of the substantially intact Barton precinct comes from the total of its components. If one of the original components is destroyed the result is a lessening of the value of the whole.

Such small precincts do not stand in the way of Canberra's growth any more than Woolloomooloo, Glebe or Paddington in Sydney. They are Canberra's equivalent, adding richness, diversity and historic values to Canberra. They are on a par with Welwyn Garden City and Letchworth in England.

Development at four times the density has no place in such areas. The National Trust has no argument about the need for increased urban density or aged persons' accommodation on appropriate sites, and these have taken place in Kingston. But our planning must ensure that these few surviving heritage precincts are not devalued by proposals which overwhelm their essential characteristics.

COUNTRY SPRING FAIR



AUSTRALIAN HERITAGE AWARD 1989



A major educational project covering Australia's early maritime heritage has won the prestigious 1989 Australian Heritage Award. The Award was made to the Western Australian Ministry of Education, Publication Section, for their entry in the Government Category - SOUTHLAND: THE MARITIME EXPLORATION OF AUSTRALIA.

The Award, a cash endowment of \$10,000, is presented by the Australian Council of National Trusts and national sponsors Jones Lang Wootton, and is designed to recognise outstanding contributions to the preservation and promotion of Australia's heritage.

What Every Restorer Should Know

Do's and don'ts for first-timers and veterans


ou've finally given in and bought an old house. Never mind that your friends think you're crazy. Never mind that you half agree. You're going to follow that dream.

Before you begin tracking down craftsmen or assigning priorities, remember this: Aside from patience and perseverance, the single most important thing you'll need is sensitivity.

The Interior Department's "Ten Basic Principles for Sensitive Rehabilitation," condensed here, belong high on any restorer's required reading list.

- **1.** Make every effort to use the building for its original purpose.
- 2. Do not destroy distinctive original features.
- **3.** Recognize all buildings as products of their own time.
- **4.** Recognize and respect changes that have taken place over time.
- **5.** Treat sensitively distinctive stylistic features or examples of skilled craftsmanship.
- **6.** Repair rather than replace worn architectural features when possible. When replacement is necessary, new material should match the old in design, composition and color.
- **7.** Clean facades using the gentlest methods possible. Avoid sandblasting and other damaging methods.
- **8.** Protect and preserve affected archeological resources.
- **9.** Compatible contemporary alterations are acceptable if they don't destroy significant historical or architectural fabric.
- **10.** Build new additions so they can be removed without impairing the underlying structure.

The Bob Vila Approach

Shy away from a building that requires tremendous capital to put the facade back in shape. When I stand in front of a brownstone, I ask myself: Is it in the realm of the feasible or the Rockefellers?

If I see problems with the cornices, the windows, sagging gutters, as well as the facade, I stop, no matter how nice the structure is.

Look for a down-scale rowhouse, a 16-or 18-footer, unless you have a lot of money. It's crazy to go after a 24-foot-wide house with a ballroom and front and back parlors. Those should only be tackled by wealthy people or developers who can subdivide the space.

Key Definitions

It helps to use the right words in talking about old buildings. Here are four of the most commonly used—and confused—terms.

Restoration: returning a building to its documented past appearance by removing later work and repairing and replacing distinctive features.

Preservation: Maintaining a building's current appearance through diligent maintenance and repairs.

Rehabilitation: repairing and altering a structure to make it livable (or usable) again. Distinctive architectural features are preserved when possible.

Remodeling: changing a building without regard to its distinctive architectural features or style.

FOUNDERS' DAY DINNER, 9 MAY 1989

The following is part of the President's address at the 1989 Founders' Day Dinner at the Hyatt Hotel Canberra before he welcomed the Guest Speaker, Dr John Ritchie:

"Tonight is a special occaison. It is our 21st BIRTHDAY. It was on the 9 May 1968 that a Canberra Women's Committee was formed as an extension of the Southern Tableland's Committee of the NSW National Trust. This marked the beginning of independent Trust activities in the ACT, which steadily blossomed until December 1976 when an autonomous ACT Trust group was established. (The President pointed out that Mrs Dorothy Moore, present at the Dinner, was a member of the 1968 Committee).

In an overview of our 21 years we have considerable achievements to our credit as a community organisation committed to the ideal of heritage conservation. Our achievements are all the more substantial when it is remembered that they are orchestrated by volunteer effort. They include

- 1. Social and education/cultural activities
- 2. Publications including the Murrumbidgee River Valley Study; Register of Classified Places (ACT); Federal Capital Architecture; Heritage of Jervis Bay; School Education Kits
- 3. Organisation of the Young Trust
- 4. Furnishing of Lanyon and the commitment to the Guardian Roster
- 5. Commercial activities such as the Gift Shops
- 6. The decision to build our own premises.

WHAT OF THE FUTURE? There is considerable potential for the Trust in the current heritage conscious climate of Canberra. We shall continue to voice our opinion on heritage issues. The immanence of Heritage Legislation in the ACT; the awareness of cultural heritage values by the Interim Planning Authority and the vowed intention of all parties in the Legislative Assembly to consider heritage matters gives the Trust a fertile opportunity to have heritage matters considered with more than just a warm glow for historic places and the urge to protect everything that is old.

With our 21st celebration it is appropriate to reflect on the part of the overall Trust management in Australia. We should be proud to be part of what Clem Lloyd in "The National Estate: Australia's Heritage" refers to as "a spearhead for preservation and conservation in Australia" where the "Trust's contribution to the creation of a national awareness of these issues has been substantial".







Weeds in urban bushland

Since its formation, the National Trust has shown concern for the conservation of bushland as part of our heritage. In 1976 the Trust employed Joan Bradley to train people in the Bradley method of Bush Regeneration at Blackwood Sanctuary, a National Trust property.

The Bradley method of bush regeneration allows for the removal of exotic plants from bushland in a manner which stabilises the bushland and discourages further weed invasion. The bush regeneration programmes have proven most successful and the Trust now employs over 70 skilled bush regenerators and contracts to 13 local government bodies, the Commonwealth and private enterprise.

For the purpose of bush regeneration a weed is considered a plant that is 'out of place'. The most common causes of weed invasion of bushland are disturbances of some kind, for example soil disturbance by mechanical means, fire, and the dumping of garden refuse.

The following lists some of the plants comnonly grown in gardens which can invade adjacent bushland. With the author's permission, all of the illustrations are taken from: Common Weeds of Sydney Bushland by Robin A. Buchanan.

Small-leaved privet

Small-Leaved Privet

The small-leaved Privet grows to a small to medium shrub with a mass of fibrous roots. It produces abundant, tiny white flowers in the Spring which frequently cause severe distress to people who suffer from allergies. The flowers are followed by dense bunches of purple-black fruit which is distributed by birds, or washed down into waterways and drainage lines where they germinate and flourish. Privet was taken to Europe and England from China and Japan. The early settlers brought Privet to Australia for hedge planting. Unfortunately, privet thrives in our mild coastal climate. All Privets should be removed from home gardens.

Asparagus

Asparagus has long arching stems, of up to 2 metres rising from a central point. The stems have prickles. The tiny white flowers are followed by attractive bright red berries.

There are areas of urban bushland where this plant has formed a complete, deep, spongy mat across the ground, inhibiting the native plants from regenerating. The removal of this weed requires that only the crown be cut out and left off the ground to dry out.

Morning Glory


This very vigorous climber originated in the tropics, however even in cool climates it is capable of completely smothering its support whether a tree or a building. It forms a dense mass of twining stems covered with large lobed soft leaves. The flowers are large blue trumpets which open at dawn and last for one day. Hence, the common name "Morning Glory". The stems root at the nodes so must be kept off the soil. This plant is so hard to control that careful consideration should be given before introducing it into your garden.

Camphor Laurels

Camphor Laurels grow into large spreading trees. The tree has a rough bark with prominent vertical cracks, and alternate leaves which are glossy on the upper surface and grey below. The most distinguishing feature is the camphor smell when parts of the plant are bruised or broken. The fruit, a small black berry, is spread by birds. Control of Camphor Laurel is very difficult as any roots left in the ground will reshoot.

Pampas Grass

Pampas Grass forms large clumps of tall tufted grass. The leaves are greyish and sharp to the touch. The long rigid flowering stem (sometimes called "Prince of Wales Feather") can reach 3 metres. Pampas grass was considered an essential plant for gardens of the 19th century. It became popular again in the 1960's. The seed is dispersed by the wind. The plant rapidly colonises disturbed areas and invades wetlands, and is easy to see and identify in bushland. A concerted effort now would bring this plant under control.

This weed is unusual in that it originated in tropical and sub-tropical Australia. Under suitable growing conditions the fronds of this fern will grow up to one metre in length. It has tough underground stems on which one to two centimetre diameter tubers are attached and the stems, roots and tubers are covered in brown scales. This fern likes to wander and is often seen invading creek banks and moist areas of bushland reserves. Once this fern has filled the space allocated for it in the garden, keep it under control by removing the 'wandering' roots and tubers.

This plant is also known as Gold and Silver Flower and originates in China and Japan. It is a very vigorous climber with attractive yellow and white flowers and the flower tube is tinged pink. The flowers have a very strong sweet scent, consequently it was commonly used to cover the outside lavatory. Sucking the nectar from the bottom of the flower tube used to be a pleasant past time for school children dawdling past overgrown gardens on the way to school. If you grow this climber the long woody stems should be kept off the ground as they root at the node when in contact with the soil. It needs constant attention.
