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

Kambah designer 'coup'

KAMBAH graphic designer Russell Kelly doesn't have to exhibit his latest work of art — it can be seen travelling along Valley roads on an ACTION bus.

For Russell, winning the opportunity to design a bus theme for the National Trust was "a great coup".

Russell, 34, says he was "fresh out of a two-year art course" when he found himself competing with two major studies for the job.

He had recently established his own business, Spectrum Graphics, when his design was chosen.

One side of the bus depicts the Sydney and Melbourne Buildings in Civic with a series of sweeping arches, as well as the Federation architecture of the Albert Hall.

The other side represents the natural

heritage aspect of the National Trust emblem, the ACT's royal bluebell floral emblem and an Aboriginal painted rock.

The design was painted onto the bus by Allan Grant of Leader Graphics in Queanbeyan and took a week to complete.

"It's prestige work because it stands out," Russell Kelly says.

"There aren't many

buses like that on the road," he said.

"It was a fun job. The design work must be really clear as it stands out even when the ous is flashing by.

"I also had to camouflage the mechanial features of the bus."

Russell operates his Spectrum Graphics business from 51 Marconi Crescent in Kambah. Beautiful Burra, lying in the hills south east of Canberra was chosen by the ACT National Trust for its spring luncheon last week.

The gardens around the Federation homestead were covered with tulips, Iceland, poppies and wisteria. Judy and John McDairmid, the owners, have also created a reception venue out of a family home, while still retaining the warm atmosphere of a lived in, and loved, dwelling.

Guest of honour was Roger Duzer, the Ambassador of France, who spoke on the conservation scene in France. Much different from that existing in Australia, conservation costs something like \$700 million yearly for the preservation and protection of every kind of French treasure, whether it be the caves at Lescaut, the refurbishment of the Louvre or the protection of the D-day beaches at Normandy.

Mr Duzer was introduced by Professor Taylor (ACT National Trust president), who is acting head of the faculty of Environmental Design at Canberra University. Hosting the lunch was the Trust's new administrator, Peter Michelson.

Pin oak felled just before estate listing

A developer felled an historic pin oak in Forrest in August, just ahead of plans to have it listed on the Register of the National Estate.

The tree was part of the Robbie Burns memorial, the city's oldest such.

The developer re-moved it after the boundary between two blocks was redrawn - moving the oak from the memorial's lease to the lease being developed.

The memorial was given to the Commonwealth in 1937 and accepted by the then Prime Minister, Joseph Lyons. The money for it was raised by Scots throughout Australia.

A provisional ringcount of the oak's stump made by the National Trust of Australia indicates it was 50 to 55 years old - roughly the same age as the memorial

The trust wrote last week to the chief planner of the Interim Territory Planning Authority, Geoff Campbell, expressing "dismay" that the tree had been removed.


"In the opinion of the trust the tree was crucial to the memorial as it provided an aesthetically pleasing background for the statue and had become associated with the visual image of the memorial," the letter says.

The adjoining block, the old Burn's Club site, is being redeveload by the

being redeveloped by the Canberra-based Capital

Property Group.

The Alliance Government allowed a surrender and regrant of the club's lease in April but it was not just regranted, it was redrawn and the bound-

ary change cleared the way for the oak's removal.

A spokesman for the authority said yesterday it was "not unusual" for block boundaries to be varied. The boundaries were changed so the de-sign of the new building could "relate better" to the memorial.

He was aware the tree had gone but said, "to the best of his knowledge" no-one had approached the authority to tell it that the tree was to be cut down.

The managing director Capital Property Group, George Snow, said arrangements were made to have the tree removed before the group was advised it had been placed on an interim list of the National Estate.

"The ITPA believes that the new building will suit the memorial much better and I think that anyone who says that we have destroyed a part of the national heritage is drawing a pretty long bow," Mr Snow said.

The trust is seeking advice from the authority on a number of issues relat-ing to the site, including "whether the boundaries of the lease have been changed recently to ac-commodate the adjoining development".

"Finally, the trust seeks advice on the administrative and legal procedures applying before significant trees on leased and unleased land in the ACT are removed." the letter

Billboard site inappropriate

Received 22 October THE NATIONAL TRUST of Australia (ACT) is opposed to the reten-tion of the billboard/city mural on City Hill and is seeking its removal. City Hill is a significant historic component of Walter Burley Grif-

fin's plan for Canberra. It was de-

signed and planted by Thomas Weston in the early 1920s and stands as one of the earliest landscape ele-ments of Canberra, along with others such as Haig Park.

It is a historic symbol of early Canberra as a planned city in a land-scape setting. The trust has classified City Hill so that it can be conserved for future generations. Thus it considers that the erection of the billboard/mural has compromised the historic value integrity number. the historic value, integrity, purpose and aesthetic value of the area by intruding into the historic landscape setting, altering the symmetrical lay-out and impeding the view of the city from the apex of City Hill and

The National Trust does not op-pose the idea of such a billboard, but City Hill is not the appropriate loca-

Keep the Tharwa bridge in use

THE NATIONAL TRUST of Australia (ACT) shares the concern of the Tharwa residents over the future of the Tharwa bridge, reported in The Canberra Times on October

The National Trust classified the bridge in 1980 and it was nominated in the Register of the National Es-tate in 1982. The Tharwa bridge is significant because

survives as the first bridge in NSW to be constructed by the then "new truss method".

It is the oldest standing bridge in the ACT.

It has provided the link for development west of the Murrumbidg-

Its appearance complements the village of Tharwa and it has come to be considered an integral part of

The 1990 report by Hardcastle and Richards was not a conservation analysis, and a requirement for one, as well as a structural integrity study, still remain. Both are required to enable future use of options and an assessment on

the heritage of the bridge to be

However, it is the trust's view that the Tharwa bridge ought to be conserved for the future. The trust also believes that it must be kept in use, preferably for road traffic, as experience has shown this to be the best means to guarantee maintenance.

"BOOK WORM'S" BEST BUYS FOR CHRISTMAS. (The books are available from the Trust Gift Shops.)

COOKING AND LOOKING AT CANBERRA Rosemary Sinclair \$9.50

At first glance this cookery book is too multi-faceted to earn a lasting place in many kitchens. It includes : household tips; medicinal recipes; recipes from other countries, from local great-grandmamas and from present day cooks. Dispersed throughout are Rosemary Sinclair's charming pen sketches of Canberra landmarks, and a short history of Canberra is included at the beginning of the book. If you have not already done so, pride in Canberra will make you buy this book both to keep and to give. Curiosity will keep you reading it - at last an easy way to achieve a genuine Tandoori chicken in a modern oven, to cope with rancid butter or to make an apple pudding the way Hans Christian There is a very good spread of recipes, all Anderson liked it. successfully used by the compiler. An excellent index, precise instructions and clear recipe presentation are all quaranted to keep you using and enjoying this cookery book from Canberra.

THE LITTLE AUSSIE FACT BOOK Margaret Nicholson \$9.00

Every guest room should have this gem of a book and it wouldn't go amiss along with iced water on all long-distance buses. one "fact" in its 204 pages is boring, not one diagram unitelligible, not one illustration, banal. The "Did you knows?" constantly surprise. "DID YOU KNOW that between 1788 and 1856 157,000 people were sent to Australia? This is only one-third of the total sent to the United Sates." The chapter headings all neatly begin with the letter P. First comes the "Past" from the dim distant through to the nation coming of age. It has beautifully clear maps as illustrations and the most interesting list of major events in sequence that you could wish for. "Profile" deals with population, flags, anthems, pulic holidays ... "Place" covers geography and Australia in the Commonwealth, the Pacific, Antarctica. "Powers" describes the Judiciary and Local "Payments, Purchases, Production" is a splendidly Government. concise summary of how Australia earns its living. Each State has its own section under "Parts". Prime Ministers, pop stars, engineers, cartoonists and many more achievers come under "People and Performances". Books, film, songs and poems are grouped under "Perceptions" and the list of much-loved Australian books is a goldmine for children, newcomers and visitors alike. section "Platypuses, Plants and Parrots" is an intriguing introduction to the whole world of Australian natural history. Eleven top favourite traditional recipes (which work!) are headed "Palate". Finally, Margaret Nicholson writes: "English is spoken in many places but the Australian brand is unmistakable. To the British our "G'Day, mate" will be curious, to the Americans it will be delightful and to the home-sick Aussie it will be music to the ears." Her selection of Australian "Phrases" amusingly rounds off this colourful portrait of the world's largest inhabitated island and least populated continent.

CORK FORK AND LADLE

The best of Australian, European and Asian recipes from Australian \$10.00

Having moved fairly recently from a "heart of the home" kitchen to one in which any surgeon would be happy to operate, my approach to cookery books has had to change for even they collect dust and attract ants. The cook books have been banished to the sitting room. So I now keep only a card-index file in the kitchen under each of twenty headings (eg. cheese dishes, left-overs, mousses and souffles, soups and so on) I allow only six recipes. Thus a recipe from a new cookery book has to be very good indeed to replace a tried and tested favourite. "Cork, Fork and Ladle" comes up trumps under this system. The book is a work of art (at \$10.00 an extraordinary snip) and will stay beautiful much longer on the coffee table than it would have in the kitchen. Even, so it also contains many, many recipes which are jostling for a place in the card index. Three have already made it : one from the section "Australian Country Cooking"; one from "Bachelor Fare", which is not food for Bachelors but recipes from bachelors of culinary talent!; one from "Recipes from the Professionals". So far none has made it from the selection of recipes from Leading Australian Restuarants but that could undoubtedly be due to the short-comings of this book.

Stocks of are good but are unlikely to remain so for long. Although the cover of the book is card the total weight could probably make it too expensive to send overseas. A very great pity, as I can think of no better advertisement for Australia.
