REPORT FROM PRESIDENT

It is some time since I made a written report in the Trust News. As we move into 1991 it is appropriate for me to comment on various issues and activities. After the summer holiday period our first major event has been the recent Antique Fair during Canberra Week. As usual it was a first class event and display of fine quality antiques. The splendid organisation by the Fund Raising Committee and the Antique Dealers Association of New South Wales and Victoria is very much appreciated. As this is such a major event and recognised as one of the finest antique displays in Canberra, plans for next year are already in hand. I was personally disappointed to have missed the opening night this year due to work commitments. It is one of my favourite Trust occasions and I am pleased that my wife was able to be there to represent both of us. To everyone who helped with the setting up, the flowers, the raffle, refreshments, operating the entrance, the Trust shop stall, sincere thanks.

One thing that is apparent from such occasions is that we are not seeing many new faces amongst the dedicated group of volunteers. Whilst not everyone has time available because of work demands, if anyone amongst the membership does have time and would like to help, even for a couple of hours, with voluntary activities please ring the office with your name. We have a body of about 200 dedicated volunteers including the Lanyon Guardians. This is one of our recognised major strengths and we should be only too happy to see additional recruits.

I am delighted to report that the first stage of restoration work at Mugga Mugga has been substantially completed particularly on the timbers of the lean-to shed. Work continues on the walls and wallpaper remnants in the cottage. The Trust has been allocated additional funds through the National Estate Grants Program for restoration of this important piece of our vernacular heritage. The work proceeds, of course, through the encouragement and enthusiasm of Miss Sylvia Curley, the owner of Mugga Mugga. I am also pleased to report that the Classification Committee has already this year documented a number of important classification proposals for sites of native flora and fauna significance.

Last year the Trust commented on various heritage issues in Canberra. One of these was the future of the billboard on City Hill. The Trust took a leading public role in asking for its removal and resiting. I am pleased to report that the ACT Government has approved the removal of the billboard. Another was the proposal for residential development on Northbourne Oval. The Trust stressed the heritage significance of the Oval and it is gratifying to see the outcome that residential development is not to be allowed.

You will have seen in the February issue of the Trust news that there is a full program of visits and events in the 1991 calendar. I look forward to seeing you at various events and particularly new members on 18 April.





HILL END AND SOFALA COACH TOUR

3 - 5 MAY 1991

Garth Setchell has now completed arrangements for this three day tour by luxury coach in autumn. He has even threatened that it will exceed last year's Mount Buffalo tour for interest and enjoyment.

The itinerary will include Guided tours, on foot and wheels, of such delightful historic town as Carcoar, Millthorpe and Canowindra. We will have a full day exploring the goldfields at Hill End and Sofala, followed by pre-dinner drinks at Miss Traill's Cottage, a National Trust property in Bathurst. The Sunday will include an early morning tour of the orchards surrounding Orange plus visits to two fascinating houses:
"Cliefden", via Mandurama - by courtesy of the Misses Rothery; "Fairview", via Canowindra - by courtesy of Mr & Mrs W Finn.
Other features will include Wyangala Dam, Richard Wigglesworth's remarkable private collection of old working engines at Sofala and last of all, the Cartobe Winery near Boorowa - to give you that final glow and to enable you to restock your cellar.

Double, twin and single accommodation (all with facilities) have been booked at the Hotel Canobolas, Orange, on both the Friday and Saturday nights but the best news is that the all inclusive price for the tour has come down. Contingent upon fuel and other prices remaining stable, it will be possible to provide all travel, accommodation, meals, refreshments (excluding dinner drinks) and guide/entrance charges for \$300 per person (double or twin accommodation) and \$320 per person (single accommodation).

UNIVERSITY OF CANBERRA

PROPOSED COURSE IN THE CONSERVATION OF TRADITIONAL BUILDING MATERIALS

The University of Canberra is developing a one-year graduate diploma course in the conservation of traditional building materials.

The course will cover aspects of the origin, use, properties, deterioration and conservation of stone, ceramics, mortars, plasters, renders, wood, metals, glass and paints and finishes.

At least part of the course will be offered as discrete modules, enabling students to take individual topics of particular interest. Depending on the results of a questionnaire survey, it is hoped that the course will be offered for the first time in 1992.

A two-week summer school is being planned as an introduction to the course. This will be open to anyone.

Expressions of interest in the course are being sought and the questionnaire will be sent to all interested bodies.

CONSUMER AND THE ENVIRONMENT - DONATIONS TO THE NATIONAL MUSEUM OF AUSTRALIA

A range of consumer products which reflect a new era of environmental consciousness is to be included in the National Museum of Australia's collection.

The Minister for Arts, Tourism and Territories, Mr David Simmons, will accept the products on behalf of the Museum in a ceremony at the K Mart supermarket in Orange, NSW, on Wednesday, 20 March.

The products include such items as unbleached toilet tissue, various detergents and cleaners, a jute shopping bag, a water timer and compost bin. K Mart has donated them in response to a call from the National Museum for items to form part of its documentation of the changing trends in consumerism.

While research and debate continues about the degree to which such products are 'environmentally friendly', the K Mart range is meeting an important niche in consumer demand.

'By collecting in this area now, the Museum will be able to document how consumer awareness, consumer power, commercial initiative and shopping patterns change over time,' Mr Simons said. 'In perhaps 50 - 100 years the 'green'-promoted products of the 1990's will help people understand some of the forces that shaped Australian society in the 1990's.'

Human interaction with the environment is a major theme of the National Museum of Australia. The museum takes a broad approach to the environmentally sensitive consumerism may well be one exhibition that greets visitors when the National Museum of Australia opens officially in 2001.
