The forty prints in this exhibition are part of a larger collection which Doug hopes will form a book on the shearers and sheds in the Hay district.


On show at Cooma Cottage starting Heritage Week.



EUCALYPTUS - THE GOOD OIL

Despite eucalypts being quintessentially Australian, most eucalyptus oil produced to supply markets for medicinal, industrial and perfumery purposes is produced overseas.

The WA Department of Conservation and Land Management is seeking to tap into a potential new market for the oil as a replacement for some petroleum based industrial solvents (such as trichloroethane) which are to be withdrawn from sale under measures to combat ozone depletion. Eucalyptus oil is recognised as an excellent solvent with the added bonus of being of low biodegradable. and toxicity International consumption of the solvent trichloroethane is estimated to be one million tonnes, about 300 times the current world production of eucalyptus oil.

The program aims to develop mallee eucalypt varieties with improved oil yields which will then be provided to farmers as a new crop which will not only produce profit, but provide shelter for stock, help rehabilitate the land and prevent further degradation such as salinisation.

THE BUILDERS OF CANBERRA 1909 - 1929 - Ann Gugler

I am in the final stages of editing the above book and have planned a book launch at the Ainslie Hall on the 7th May, 1994 at 2 pm. The building is significant to me because it was the old Russell Hill School from 1927-1929, and prior to that the Masonic Hall at Acton. I strongly suspect that it began its life as a Molonglo building. I intend to put up a display of photographs and other documents which may be of interest.

The book consists of around 446 pages of which over a 100 are photographs, maps, cartoons, etc. I hope to sell it for around \$25.00. The work has been compiled from people's stories, Australian Archival material and other sources such as Community News, Queanbeyan Age, Federal Capital Pioneer, and Canberra Times. I have documented over seventy camps, settlements sites of the construction era. In addition to the sites I have attempted to identify as many of the people who lived in the F.C.T. between the years 1909-1929. The first major list I have transcribed is the 1913 Census which names the head of household in the F.C.T. In addition I have transcribed the 1928 Electoral Roll (first in the territory) and placed people according to suburbs, camps and settlements.

L.H.B. Lassetter of gold reef fame, lived in Canberra from around March 1926 until early 1927. He lived at Northbourne Camp until joined by his family in late 1926 when he moved with them to the Russell Hill settlement. Lassetter wrote for the Community News under the nom de plume of The Gleaner. I have included a number of articles written by him in the book.

There are ten chapters in the book:

Chapter One is a social history of the period and includes a number of stories from people who lived here in the early period.

Chapter Two outlines the types of housing available and alphabetical list of camps.

Chapter Three, the main settlements from the period 1910 onwards and includes, Acton, Brickworks (Yarralumla), Cotter River, Duntroon and the Power House.

Chapter Four, Molonglo Tenements and camps constructed using Molonglo building.

Chapter Five, Major Settlements in the 1920s - Causeway, Westlake, Riverbourne and Russell Hill.

Chapter Six Major Camps in the 1920s.

Chapter Seven Hotels and Hostels.

Chapter Eight Lady Houptoun Club and Printers' Quarters.

Chapter Nine Permanent Suburbs.

Chapter Ten Areas Outside the City Limits.

I would be interested to hear from anyone who would like a copy of the book in order to assist with making a decision of how many copies to print. Also if you would like to attend the launch (catering). My address is 6 Stillwell Place Mawson 2607 and phone number is (06) 2900057.

P.S. I started to write about Westlake, the settlement in which I lived with my family from 1941 until 1959, but soon found that to isolate one settlement was, to me, an impossible task. I could not find anything written about the camps and settlements other than a little about the Causeway. Thus my task began!



INTERSTATE PROPERTIES - RUNNYMEDE, TASMANIA

RUNNYMEDE, 61 Bay Road, NEW TOWN, HOBART. A gracious colonial house standing in charming grounds overlooking New Town Bay.

Runnymede was built circa 1836 for Robert Pitcairn, the first lawyer to qualify in the colony, and was originally named 'Cairn Lodge.' Pitcairn was a leading advocate for the abolition of transportation. In 1850 he sold the house to the first Anglican Bishop in Van Diemen's Land, the Right Reverend Francis Russell Nixon, D.D., who added the music room and renamed the house 'Bishopstowe'. The seafarer, Captain Charles Bayley, acquired the house in 1864 and named it 'Runnymede' after his favourite ship. The house remained with his descendants until it was acquired by the State Government in 1967 who leased it to the National Trust.

The re-opening of the coachhouse and stables now provides even more for the visitor to see at Runnymede. The coachhouse and stables are in a small but imposing building of symmetrical classic Georgian design. The stable has a cobblestone floor and the original horse stalls. A small loft at the back of the building was once the sleeping quarters for a groom and stablehand.

RUNNYMEDE has been restored and furnished by the National Trust as a gentleman's residence of the 1840-1860 period.

Open daily 10:00am - 4:30pm. Closed Christmas Day, Good Friday and during July for maintenance.

"HERITAGE FARMING in AUSTRALIA"

A time capsule record of a vanished way of doing things. The combination of 16mm film and still photographs from Ian Sloane capture the transition from horse-powered farming to early mechanical inventions in the 1930's.

At \$35 this is a definite must for anyone interested in Australian history.

Continuing our series on Trust properties overseas:

INTERNATIONAL PROPERTIES - UFFINGTON WHITE HORSE, OXFORDSHIRE

This is the best known, and oldest, of the several horses carved into the chalk hillsides of southern England. Recent excavations of the site indicate that the figure lies within a great prehistoric funerary complex used for more than 4,000 years from about 3,500 B.C. Facing the horse's head are the remains of a 25 metre long burial mound which dates back 5,500 years. Almost immediately above the head, an early Bronze Age burial mound has also been discovered, dating back 4,500 years. The exact connection between these and the horse remain unclear. The horse itself may have been carved in the Iron Age - a period in which the dead were seldom buried under mounds. So far, no Iron Age burial sites are known in this area, but on the hill above the horse is a fine Iron Age hill fort.

The site is also part of the legend of St George. From the top of the hill it is easy to identify the small, cone-shaped hill beside the road below where, according to tradition, St George killed the dragon. The hill is called Dragon Hill, and if you look closely you can see a bare patch where no plant life grows; the earth poisoned by the dragon's blood.


The Uffington Horse is located on the A420 near Swindon. This fascinating area may be approached on foot from the Ridgeway path or by car from B4507. There is a large carpark 500 yards from the monument.

WALKS AND TOURS PROGRAM

Despite the popularity of last year's program, bookings so far this year have been slower than anticipated.

Early bookings are very important to us because, without such positive indications of support, it is sometimes necessary for us to scale down initial reservations for accommodation and transportation. In such circumstances, it may not always be possible for us to accept applications received close to an event.


Although all activities are keenly priced and represent excellent value, it is realised that some members may have difficulty in raising the money for a booking involving several activities. In order to ease this burden, yet allow us to tally up numbers, nonrefundable deposits of \$10 per person will be accepted by the Trust Office for multiple activity bookings in respect of those activities which do not 6 weeks of within commence application. Full payment will still be required by the "Bookings Close" date for each activity.

Apart from the published activities, expressions of interest (accompanied

by a refundable \$10 per person deposit) are still open for the Heritage Tour of Southern Queensland, DC3 Charter Flight to Lake Mungo and the Repeat Tour to South-East Victoria, as summarised in the February Trust News.

Contrary to advice in that issue, the first of several planned Sydney tours has been delayed to cater for the new possibility of a Phantom of the Opera package if sufficient interest exists. Details are set out in the accompanying Tours Program insert. AT LEAST 25 APPLICATIONS, WITH PART PAYMENT, BY 14 APRIL ARE NEEDED TO CONFIRM FEASIBILITY. Payments will be refunded in full if the tour does not proceed.

On the other hand, it can now be confirmed that a major 8-day tour to the Victorian goldfields, including Rutherglen, Echuca and many other interesting destinations, is currently being arranged for the period from Saturday 5 to Saturday 12 November 1994. Refundable deposits of \$10 per person are now being accepted for this tour.

Opalised fossils are not found anywhere else in the world. When the business that bought him went into liquidation, the ABC's Quantum program held a highly successful public appeal to 'save' Eric from being sold to an overseas investor. It took the Australian Museum in Sydney 450 hours to reconstruct him.

The public appeal also raised enough money to ensure Eric toured the country and his only stopover in Canberra will be at Yarramundi.

The Town Centres.

The Second Town Centre. BELCONNEN

The name Belconnen has belonged (used) in this area since the early settlers arrived. It was the name given to a land grant made in 1837 to explorer Captain Charles Sturt. There are various Aboriginal meanings to the word 'Belconnen' it was the name of a creek in the area and legend has it that an Aborigine searching for a stockman or shepherd used the words Bail Connen - bail means 'not' or 'no'.

WODEN The First Town Centre.

In 1837 Dr James Murray bought 2500 acres and called it 'Woden' Dr Murray was also a classical scholar and it is thought he named 'Woden' after the Norse God of War who was also the Patron of Learning. There is still a homestad call "Woden", occupied, incidentally, by a long standing members of the National Trust Mr and Mrs Charles Campbell.

TUGGERANONG The Third Town Centre.

When the first settler James Murdoch arrived in 1824 the local Aborigines called it 'Togranon' which means cold plains. The explorer Charles Throsby had reached the valley in 1821.
