

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HERITAGE UPDATE

This column is to make you, the members, aware of any known proposed changes to heritage properties in the ACT.

PROPOSED REFURBISHMENT OF EAST BLOCK

The Classification Committee of the Trust was briefed by architect Eric Martin from Cox Architects & Planners, and Nick Forostenko of Australian Estate Management (AEM) on this project.

East Block is significant as part of a group of buildings (with Parliament House & West Block) which formed the essential facilities in the early development of Canberra. It is a fine example of Federal Capital architecture, designed in 1924 by Government Architect, J. S. Murdoch. It was also the original location of the Post Office and Telephone Exchange associated with the move of Parliament to Canberra.

The Telephone Exchange facility has already been relocated, and Australia Post has indicated it now wishes to re-locate.

The policy for the future of the building is that it should be conserved and used primarily for Government offices. Until there is commitment from interested tenants no design details of the refurbishment are available. The Trust has been assured by AEM that Trust input into the design would be considered.

OBITUARY—MARY TRELOAR (NEE LANG)

The National Trust (ACT) would like to extend our condolences to the family of long standing Trust member, Mary Treloar, who passed away on April 26th. Mrs Treloar was a family historian, grazier and poet. Two books of her poetry were published in the 1930s. Mrs Treloar was well travelled, visiting England many times and also journeying to Scandinavia, Eastern Europe and the United States. A bad fall during a trip to Chile last year led to the illness which precipitated her death.

After the Trust sent a letter of sympathy to the family, Mrs Treloar's daughter, Anne Spencer responded with the following words to the Trust—

"Thank you so much for your letter and kind words about mum. She certainly was devoted to the preservation of Lanyon, and enjoyed her days there."

OBITUARY—JOHN WHELAN

On May 19th, the National Trust of Australia (NSW) lost one of it's pioneers. John Whelan established the first branch of the Trust outside Sydney when, in 1968, he set up the Southern Tablelands Division based in Goulburn. Mr Whelan served on the committee for six years, worked at public education on heritage issues and on the preservation of heritage buildings. It was the fund-raising Ladies Committee of this branch which eventually led to the formation of the ACT Trust.

COMMUNITY HISTORY AWARDS ATTRACT WIDE INTEREST

Australia-wide interest has been shown in the two Community History Awards which are to be presented at the State History Conference which will be held in Adelaide on September 21st and 22nd. These awards are the only ones to be offered in Australia for Community History_a rapidly growing genre—and are being organised by South East Book Promotions, a group of writers and historians from the South East of South Australia, who in 1994 won the ABC Economic Development Award.

Over a hundred books have been nominated and they are fascinating selection dealing with a wide range of subjects from the Convict Timbergetters of Pennant Hills to The Dreaming of a remarkable Aboriginal lady, Ruby Hammond. Among other books submitted for judging is an illustrated history of Colonial Crime by Katoomba writer Edgar Penzig and a book telling the story of emigration after World War II through letters by Victorian writer, Edith Torokfalvy. As well there are a number of district histories from such diverse places as Spring Bay in Tasmania to Capel in Western Australia. There are also accounts of Women in Destitute Asylums, early homestead gardens, tales of the Coorong and the first swimming pool in Canberra.

Known as the BankSA Christina Smith Award and the Australian Council of National Trusts Ebenezer Ward Award, the awards commemorate two remarkable figures from early South Australia and aim to increase the standard of Community History writing and also its standing among historians, retailers and readers. The first Christina Smith Award, which is for a book over 30,000 words, was presented two years ago and was won by An All Consuming Passion, by a young writer named William Lines. It is the account of the work and life of a young Englishwoman, Georgiana Molloy, who migrated with her husband to Western Australia in the early nineteenth century and lived in the Australian bush, whose beauty she learned to love.

The second award, which will be given for the first time this year, was set up to give prominence to the number of valuable small histories that are being written. It has met with an enthusiastic response from writers and from the State History Trust of South Australia who are backing the South Eastern group. All books are currently being judged by a panel of well known historians and writers.

OVERSEAS NATIONAL TRUST PROPERTIES

ARDUAINE GARDEN, ARGYLL, SCOTLAND

In 1897 James Campbell bought this piece of land (then known as Asknish Farm) on a promontory between Loch Melfort and the Sound of Jura, to set up his home. He re-named the estate Arduaine (meaning 'green headland') and after building a new farmhouse, began work on the gardens in 1903.

One of the first things Campbell did was to plant a belt of 2,000 larch seedlings to shelter the property from the damaging salt laden winds. These form cover for the magnificent 18 acre gardens there today. After his death in 1927 his son Bruce continued work on the gardens, but after the first World War, Bruce's son Iain struggled to keep up its maintenance. By the 1960s things were at a

standstill and the house was sold in 1964. A severe gale felled many mature trees in 1968.

New life was breathed into the gardens at Arduaine when the property was acquired by Edmund and Harry Wright in 1971. The Wright brothers spent over twenty years restoring the gardens, making them into the magnificent display of rhododendrons, azaleas and magnolias on show today. In 1992 the Wright brothers donated the property to the National Trust for Scotland.

The gardens are open all year round from 9.30 until sunset. Meals and refreshments are available from the adjacent Loch Melfort Hotel.

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INTERSTATE PROPERTIES

OLD GOVERNMENT HOUSE, PARRAMATTA

Governor Phillip first established a farm on this site at Parramatta in 1788. Part of the present house dates from 1799, and between 1812 and 1818 Governor Macquarie made additions and alterations which dramatically transformed both the farm and the house. Renowned architect, Francis Greenway designed the house's front portico.

The land on which Old Government House stands was the first piece of cleared land at Parramatta and was where the first successful crops were grown. Governor Macquarie entertained visiting foreign dignitaries in this house, including French Captain Louis de Freycinet.

For several years from 1878 the building was used as a boarding house. In 1910 the house was repaired and leased by the King's School until they found new premises and it was taken over by the National Trust. Since this time extensive restorations have taken place revealing much about the property's history.

Old Government House contains the nation's most comprehensive collection of early colonial furniture, including a chair made especially for Governor Macquarie which has a kangaroo hide seat cover.

Facilities include a restaurant, theatrette, garden and park. Access is by rail, ferry or car, with parking provided. There is ample room for picnicking and there are also barbecue facilities. Guide dogs are permitted.

The house is located at Parramatta Park, Parramatta, 28 kms from Sydney. It is open to the public from 10.00 to 4.00 each Tuesday to Friday and from 11.00 to 4.00 each Saturday and Sunday. Enquiries may be made on (02) 9635 8149. Experiment Farm and Elizabeth Farm are both close by. Why not make a day of it and visit all three properties!



This is a propagating marathon aiming to establish 30,000 trees and shrubs for Greening Australia's revegetation activities.


Greening Australia Community Tree Planting Project

RECENT NATIONAL TRUST CLASSIFICATIONS

NASA GROUND STATIONS

Recently Classified by the National Trust are the NASA Ground Stations encompassing the CDSCC Tidbinbilla Tracking Station, and the sites of the former Orroral Valley and Honeysuckle Creek Tracking Stations. As part of Namadgi National Park the latter two are already listed on the Register of the National Estate. The Orroral Valley and Honeysuckle Creek Tracking Stations have been demolished but the slabs remain of the various buildings which once dotted the sites.

Since the 1940s Australia has participated in missile development programmes and deep space exploration. In 1947 Australia became only the third country in the world to build and launch its own satellite. Since the 1960s Australia has worked with the United States as part of the US world wide tracking network. Under this arrangement Australia has been involved in the Apollo and Skylab programs, and continues to play a part in space exploration.

Statement of Significance

All three sites have played a major part in the exploration and study of Deep Space. They represent the international co-operation required for space tracking and the facilities that remain still demonstrate a high degree of technical innovation and achievement. Honeysuckle Creek was involved in the first crewed landing on the moon, relaying the initial television broadcast of Neil Armstrong's words as he stepped onto the moon's surface.

The gardens exhibit an interesting example of late 20th century landscaping of scientific establishments. These sites show the transition of an isolated grazing area in the A.C.T. becoming an essential link in the global space tracking network. The sites are of value to the community for their educational role as a prime Australian source of readily accessible information about Australia's role in space activities, and our understanding of the solar system.

The Trust hopes that by Classifying these sites, their numerous heritage values will be considered in their future site management.

CARD LAMINATING NOW AVAILABLE

KING GEORGE V MEMORIAL

This memorial was previously listed by the Trust but the Classification Committee has recently updated this Classification, this time using the standard criteria for heritage classification which were not in place when the previous classification was done.

Statement of Significance

The memorial commemorates King George V, monarch at the time of the opening of Old Parliament House, and symbolises the link between this monarch and the formulative years of the Federal Parliament of Australia. It demonstrates Australian loyalty to the British Crown and the unity of the British Empire under the Crown.

The memorial is the work of Rayner Hoff, Australia's premier public sculptor of the inter war period. It is an Art Deco work of considerable merit.

There are no other comparable memorials within the A.C.T. Its siting is symbolic in constitutional and historic terms and significant in terms of urban planning.

GINNINDERRA OLD VILLAGE PRECINCT

This precinct covers the area which was the social and religious centre of Ginninderra Village until the early 20th century, and which is now a thriving tourist and craft centre. Still remaining from the 19th century are a schoolhouse and attached residence built in the Victorian Georgian style, a Roman Catholic Church and several outbuildings. The schoolhouse and residence retain their original fireplaces, windows, mantelpieces etc..

A windbreak of pines was planted to the west of the school in the 1920s.

Some of the old buildings now on the site were imported from other areas and are therefore not significant to the heritage of the site. Blocks 319 and 329 now house car parks and the George Harcourt Inn. Although the Trust recognises their importance as part of the original village precinct, these two blocks have been Recorded only.

Statement of Significance

The Ginninderra Old Village Precinct represents the most important remaining evidence of the 19th century rural village of Ginninderra before the establishment of the Federal Capital Territory.

The precinct has a strong social and religious significance as the centre of the once prosperous village.

The buildings are set on land associated with interactive neighbour buildings (i.e. Deasland Homestead and Curran's Blacksmith building).

St Francis RC Church, built in 1872 for both school and church, became the first Roman Catholic church in the area which has since become the A.C.T.

The schoolhouse, designed by architect William Kemp, is significant as an intact example of a late 19th century school building, and of the then current masonry techniques.

WORLD HERITAGE NOMINATION—SYDNEY OPERA HOUSE

In July 1995, the Commonwealth and New South Wales governments together issued a brief to prepare a World Heritage Nomination of the Sydney Opera House in its setting. Joan Domicelj was appointed as principal consultant. The project is funded by the Commonwealth with support in kind by the State. The first stage of the work was the assessment of World Heritage values and the definition of the boundaries of the area to be nominated.

The management implications of the nomination were also considered and stakeholder groups were identified. A reference group was formed to co-operate with the two governments in the project, represented by the Commonwealth Department of Environment, Sport and Territories and the NSW Department of Urban Affairs and Planning. The group consist of twenty-four representatives of relevant special interest and stakeholder groups, of which the principal stakeholder is the Sydney Opera House Trust. The National Trust movement is represented by Professor Ken Taylor, President of the ACT Trust.

The results of the evaluation show that the Sydney Opera House in its harbour setting has outstanding universal value and justifies inscription on the World Heritage List under three of the six cultural criteria for World Heritage places. A property need only meet one criterion to be included on the World Heritage List. The boundaries determined, after much discussion, follow the high water mark from Blues Point to Cremorne Point to the north and from Dawes Point to Mrs Macquaries Point to the south, enclosing the waters of the inner harbour, Fort Denison, Sydney Harbour Bridge and the Sydney Opera House site on Bennelong Point south to the Tarpeian Cliff.

The Sydney Opera House is identified as a masterpiece of creative genius which is inextricably tied to its harbour setting. The inner harbour, Sydney Harbour Bridge and Fort Denison are all integral parts of the nomination. Together they form an outstanding evolving landscape which, through the sequence of physical markers of fort, bridge and opera house, illustrates significant stages in 19th and 20th century history. This cultural landscape is both directly associated with the extraordinary cultural encounter between Aboriginal people and British colonists, and is enriched by the quality of artistic and literary works it has inspired.

An important test of the evaluation is the 'authenticity' of the nominated property. The Guidelines to the World Heritage Convention require that nominated properties 'meet the test of authenticity in design, material, workmanship or setting'. In the case of the Sydney Opera House, most of the building's exterior was constructed according to Jørn Utzon's design, but the interiors and glass walls were completed to the design of a later Australian team of architects. This controversial change of designer remains a source of continuing public debate. An archival research project to address this issue has been initiated by the New South Wales and Commonwealth governments. Its brief seeks to collate a consolidated catalogue of Utzon's drawings and related papers held in public collections and to assess and study that material. It will both provide an accurate historical record and

assess the design intentions revealed and the extent to which those intentions have been technically resolved. The results of the research will be included in the 1997 review of the Opera House's current Interim Conservation Plan, as matter to be taken into consideration for any future modifications of the building.

The Nomination document is well illustrated with maps showing location and management arrangements and with related artworks and photography to support the arguments justifying the World Heritage listing on the site. With the approval of State and Commonwealth governments, it is to be forwarded to UNESCO's World Heritage Centre in Paris before the administrative deadline of 1 July 1996. It will then follow a process of international evaluation before the World Heritage Committee's final decision in December 1997 as to whether the property should be included on the World Heritage List.



PREPARING THE MEMORIAL FOR THE NEXT CENTURY



Over the next decade the Memorial will be undertaking an extensive program to revitalise all its galleries and to conserve the historic building in which the galleries are housed. The aim

is to present the Memorial's message of commemoration and understanding of Australians' service and sacrifice in war in the most effective and memorable way possible. This will draw on the traditional strengths of the Memorial and also result in some major changes to the existing galleries and exhibitions.


Since the 1980s, the Memorial has been analysing data to develop a clearer picture of who comes to visit and why, so that the new gallery development program will offer every visitor a relevant and meaningful experience. The research clearly emphasises that the Memorial enjoys a very diverse range of visitors. There are people who are related to Australians who have died in war, veterans, service personnel, their friends and families, school students (more than 80 000 visit per year), groups of families and friends (particularly domestic tourists to Canberra) and a large number of coach tour visitors. A large proportion of our one million visitors, around 27%, are under 16 years of age.

The new gallery development program is focused on effectively meeting the needs of this diverse range of people. Physical changes to the floor plan, for example, will make it easier for visitors to find their way around. In the new design, galleries and other facilities will branch out from a centrally located information space. This will make it easier for visitors to choose what to see, what order to see it in, how to get there, and, when they need a rest, where to get that much needed cup of coffee.

The galleries will also be transformed. There will be a new Orientation Gallery, which will be a place of transition for the newly arrived visitor. It will foster an awareness of the special commemorative aspect of the Memorial, and will provide the visitor with an understanding of what a tour of the Memorial will mean and the possibilities it will offer.

There will be a new reference area, integrated with the galleries, which will provide ready access to the Memorial's vast collection of war records and related material for family history searches and other more specialised needs. Redevelopment of the exhibition galleries will draw on modern exhibition techniques and the Memorial's rich collection to effectively express the story of Australians at war. Among the first of these will be the gallery covering the period 1942-45, and a major exhibition on the Pacific air war. At the same time the Memorial will be careful to ensure that its special heritage is preserved. Icons such as the famous dioramas which Australians have come to love will be integrated with many items which have never been seen before. Old favourites, such as the Gallipoli boat, will be on show again

The redevelopment program will demand a large commitment of resources over the coming years, and this cannot be achieved without the continuing support offered by the Australian community. The program has already benefited from donors' generosity in supporting restoration projects such as the Gallipoli Plan Model, and the Mosquito aircraft which will be a major element of the new Pacific air war exhibition. In later articles we will include updates on the program to give you a fuller idea of how your support is making a difference



SHORT CUTS

A JOB WELL DONE

Restoration of Brayshaw's Hut in the Namadgi National Park was completed earlier this year. Undertaken by the Kosciusko Huts Association with the assistance of the Parks and Conservation Service, work on the project spanned five years. To celebrate the completion of the restoration project, members of the Brayshaw family were among those who attended an open day and official ceremony presided over by Gary Humphries MLA.

BEWARE THE DANGERS WITHIN

Tilbury Fort in Essex was built as a coastal fortification for Henry VIII in 1539, however, there was never any threat to these defences. Indeed, the most violent event in it's history occurred in 1776 at a cricket match which left three men dead and many wounded! Heritage Today, June 1996, No. 34

KURRAJONG LEADS THE WAY

From "Project", a newsletter produced by the Environment Protection Agency, we hear that the Hotel Kurrajong has effectively reduced its waste by a third following the introduction of several strategies. These include using refillable dispensers for soaps and detergents, using detergents and soaps without animal and vegetable fats and recycling everything from glass to corks. Each week a 240 litre bin of food scraps is sent to a worm farm instead of to the tip.

INROADS INTO EUROPE?

The UK National Trust Magazine reports that there is to be a Trust-like body formed in France to look after those buildings which are not at present commercially run. The first properties under consideration for the new body to administer are the former homes of Zola and Voltaire.

The magazine also reports that a group of Polish horticulturalists have been visiting gardens owned by the UK Trust with the aim of setting up a similar heritage body in Poland.

We are, as yet, unable to say whether there will be any reciprocal arrangements made with these new organizations.

FACELIFT FOR LUNA PARK

The Victorian National Trust reports that work is proceeding on restoration of some of the most notable features of Luna Park. Before the end of the year it is hoped that restoration work on the 1913 carousel, the entrance face and towers and the scenic railway will be completed.

HARPER'S MANSION

This charming house in Berrima is steadily gaining in character with the addition of furniture, fittings and incidental items. The ACT Trust's three piece drawing room suite was the first furniture lent to the Berrima District Branch for this house. This, and several other items since lent or donated, are making Harper's Mansion into a charming home which is well worth a visit.

PARLIAMENT HOUSE ON FIRE

That silent incendiary, Old Sol, recently gave Canberra's countless early risers a start that nearly jolted their Canberra calmness out of them. It was a misty morning and a snow-like blanket was lazily rolling itself over the face of things, muffling everything in a mantle of so thick a texture that only the dimmest of outlines pierced the veil. The great parliamentary pile itself seemed but a mass of mist, when, without a word of warning, the great edifice burst into flame, crimson and lurid, as a vast city conflagration. It seemed for a second or so that the beautiful white building would soon be but a handful of black ashes; then the mind adjusted itself to the phenomenon, and one realised that the sun had just climbed the peak of Mount Ainslie, and was crimsoning all outstanding objects with his ruddy torch, that we looked at reflected flame and not at real fire. Early rising citizens breathed again and went into breakfast.

HEARD ON THE 'BUS

Lady to neighbour: "We are so pleased we are going to live in a better neighbourhood."

GLIMPSES OF EARLY CANBERRA—THE STIRLING PARK STORY

Marjie took me to school. I was five years of age and the year, 1942. The school was Telopea Park Infants and we had to walk from our homes in the Westlake valley over the hill past the American Embassy and down to State Circle where we caught the school bus at a cost of one penny each way. In bad weather we could take shelter in the old bus shed (which during the 1954 Queen's visit was painted pink!). As soon as I learnt to ride a push bike my parents bought one for me and I rode to and from school via the track which passed through the Capitol Hill Hostel, the site of which is now covered by the new Parliament House.

I lived in one of 61 unlined green coloured timber box-like cottages erected between 1924–1926 for tradesmen working on the Provisional Parliament House and its surrounds. I lived with my parents, Violet and Leonard Austin, at 27 Westlake, and Marjie lived with hers, Florence and Andy Hawke, at number 36. Marjie's Hawke grandparents also lived at Westlake—at number 18. The Hawkes had come from Araluen in the 1920s and both breadwinners worked as engine drivers. We came from Collarenabri in 1940 and Dad worked at Brodie's garage in Wentworth Avenue.

I started school after my birthday in June. My mother dressed me in the daffodil yellow dress which was the Infants' School uniform. She had great difficulty in obtaining it because during the war many items were in short supply and clothing rationing was in place. I only wore the dress a few times because the uniform dress code was suspended for the duration of the war; in later years I wore a dark navy coloured tunic with white

blouse. Both girls and boys were supposed to wear a tie. Mind you, now that I think back to that time, I remember that few children wore the full school uniform and many came to school without shoes.

Telopea Park's school song was written by Molly Dunn who lived in Kennedy Street, Kingston. Molly's maiden name was McKissock and before her marriage she lived with her parents at 4 Westlake. Molly had been a member of the Westlake Women's Cricket Club, some members of which represented the Federal Capital Territory in the 1935 match held at the Manuka Oval against the visiting English team (we won!).

At the beginning of 1996 I was awarded a Heritage Grant to write a history of Westlake and mark the sites of the old camps and settlements on a modern map. I have been aided in the task by people who lived in the area. Amongst them are Dorrie and Arthur Maxwell, Colin Smith and his parents, Doris and Tom, Marjie Rundle (nee Hawke), Stan Brill, Ken Dinnerville and Arthur Freeman.

The Westlake settlement had a hall, which had started life as a Mess for the men of No. 3 Sewer Camp. The hall was central to the life of the community and in it were held dances, engagement parties, children's Christmas parties, meetings, smokos and church services. During the early years of the Social Service Association (1925-1929), which replaced the Westlake Progress Association, a tennis court near the hall and children's playground in the reserve area in front of cottages 22-29 were built using the 50/50 system—that is, if the Federal Capital Commission supplied the materials, the men of the community would

supply the labour. By the time we settled at Westlake in 1941 both facilities had been replaced with trenches and the previous tenant of No. 27 had provided us with an air raid shelter dug deep into the earth backyard. All suburbs and schools had trenches and it was common for our daily routines to include air raid drill which commenced with the wailing sound of the air raid siren.

Whilst researching the construction era of Canberra (1909-1929) I came across numerous documents on Westlake Settlement in the Australian Archives. Amongst them were complaints which ranged from concern about the overflow from the septic to the plea for plugs for the kitchen sinks.

During my research I discovered that my Westlake was only one of many and that in 1925 the population of the area had been around 700, which represented approximately one fifth of the population of the Territory at that time!

The residents were accommodated in 51 (later 61) Westlake cottages, 3 government single men's tent'camps' (No. 3 Sewer 1922-1925, Old Tradesmen's 1923-1928 and No.1 Labourers 1924-1927) and Contractor Howie's settlement. This settlement consisted of around 18 timber huts for single men—known as the Hostel Camp (1922-circa June 1927), and 25 two-three bedroom timber cottages for his married tradesmen—known as Howie's Cottages (1922-1931). All were connected to electricity and water.

Ken Dinnerville and Arthur Freeman lived at Howie's Cottages. Ken's father was plumber in charge of work on the Hotel Canberra. Arthur lived at several Westlake sites, the first being No. 3 Sewer Mess where his father commenced work as Mess Caterer in 1923. The following year the family moved into a tent "cottage" which had timber sides and floor. It was erected on site between the Old Tradesmen's camp and Howie's Cottages. It was here that the youngest child, a son, was born in November 1924. Mrs Ruth Freeman was blind and one wonders how she managed. In 1927 the family moved into No. 13 Howie's Cottages where they remained until 1930 before moving to Causeway to be near Mr Freeman's work as night watchman at the Power House.

Each camp was provided with a Mess which was also used for recreational purposes and, in addition, Contractor Howie erected a hall which was used regularly for church services and dances.

The men who lived in timber dwellings fared much better than those in the government camps where two men were crammed into each 10 x 8ft. canvas tent. The men of the Old Tradesmen's camp had the added comfort of timber floors and sides to their tents. Bathing facilities were primitive, and for those not hardy enough to brave the unheated water in the colder months, a wood-fired copper was installed to heat the bath water.

By the end of 1928 all the 'camps' had gone, some of Howie's cottages were dismantled around 1925 and the remaining 13 were taken over by the F. C. C. before October 1926 but disappeared by the end of 1931. In the early 1960s the Westlake settlement cottages were, with the exception of two which burnt down, sold and relocated to new sites. Only the timber section of each house was moved.

The former sites of cottages 1-20, with the exception of the site of No. 17, are covered by buildings in Empire Circuit and Darwin Avenue. The site of No. 17 is now a vacant block of land opposite the Finnish Embassy.

Left behind on sites occupied by cottages 22-26 are the concrete slabs of the combined laundry, bath and lavatory areas, along with numerous other relics. Some of these have been photographed, including a 1926 ceramic gully trap, a garden bed edged with Canberra Tiles, a concrete slab with "1944 A. Campbell 1944" scratched into its surface and a concrete path lined with Canberra pavers. Some of the old trees and hedges remain, such as the the four tall pines which lined the back fence of 28 and now stand near the intersection of Perth Avenue and Empire Circuit. In the valley is a tall old gum tree which stood in the backyard of 36. Hanging from one of its branches is a length of wire put there in the 1940s by Andy Hawke for use as a wireless aerial.

In the area where cottages 29-52 stood, numerous concrete pipes break through the surface of the ground. They may be pipes which connected cottages to the septic tanks. Some appear to lead to a channel which joins the creek. In the area between, the heavy machinery used in the recent process of removing the non-native plants from the sides of the creek and nearby areas has exposed one of the two reinforced concrete Westlake septic tanks. The thrill of finding the tank (which may be the only one left of the many put in place near every major settlement prior to 1927) was diminished by the destruction of two old willows planted over a century ago on the creek bank. The trees may have been part of the consignment of willow cuttings brought out "in potatoes" from St Helena in the 1830s. They were planted along the banks of the Molonglo River.

Arthur Freeman told me about the Sewer Camp. The majority of miners hailed from Captains Flat and the camp numbered around 100 men who were accommodated in two rows of tents which stretched across the base of the hill where, in 1926, cottages 53-62 Westlake were constructed. To prevent water from flooding into the tents at times of heavy rain, a ditch was dug above the tent line. Later, the rear fences of the cottages ran just below this ditch and the small section which remains is in the area above the sites of cottages 57 to 59. On one occasion young Arthur was lowered in the cage down the 200ft. deep concrete-lined shaft to the tunnel below and walked through the tunnel from Westlake to Westridge. Power for the cage and mullock buckets was provided by a wood-fuelled, steam-driven traction engine.

The mullock from the tunnel was loaded into skips which were pushed along a small rail track before being disposed of over the side of the hill. When the sewer work at Westlake was completed two mullock dumps remained one next to the Sewer Vent and another between cottages 28 and 53. Each was known as "The Dump" and we children made slides down their sides. Both dumps were cleared away some time following the removal of the Westlake cottages. However, numerous reminders of the sewer workers remain on the hill, such as old, dead gums cut at waist level, rusting kerosene tins, slabs of concrete with rusting cut-off bolts, a concrete trench, river rocks

and the Sewer Vent, which is referred to on modern maps as "Monument".

On the Westlake hills there is evidence of an earlier period of mining—surface mining which took place some time between the early 1860s (when mining first came to the district) and the turn of the century. Two of the Westlake hillsides where the early miners worked are scarred with old mullock heaps, numerous holes, channels which zig-zag down the hillside and trees left high on islands of earth.

What did the men mine? A silver load was found by sewer miners some 40ft. below ground level. But this metal was not on the surface and it is likely that the miners sought gold or copper. There is no oral tradition of mining at Westlake, but this is not surprising because from around 1911 land owners were dispossessed and replaced with a population of construction workers, the majority of whom came from other states.

What about the sites of Tradesman's and No. 1? The men who lived in them are now dead, hence positive identification of sites and stories are difficult to find. Arthur and Ken remembered calling at No. 1 where they were joined by other workmen's sons on their way to Telopea Park School. Ken and Arthur pointed out where they thought the camps had been. Armed with this information I set out to find traces of each camp which meant walking the hillsides with one eye almost glued to the ground and the other making sure that I did not surprise one of the current residents sunning on a rock or in the long grass.

One day I saw a neat row of rocks almost hidden in the grass and remembered an old photograph which showed the cooks of No. 1 leaning against a wire fence which confined a garden bed. The base of the fence was held down by a similar row of rocks. On closer examination of the area I noted at right angles to the rocks a trench about 15 inches wide and 12ft. long. Nearby is part of a concrete pipe. I cleared the long grass which revealed several channels leading to the pipe from whence the water was directed into the nearby creek. In the channel and trench are circular garden beds each ringed with thirteen large stones. I next looked up the hill towards the Singapore High Commission and noted two piles of earth. Closer examination showed that each consisted of numerous Canberra half bricks which were most likely used for an ablution block floor. Nearby were more channels and a few irises and hyacinths. I had found part of the Tradesmen's Camp!

Walks in the area between the Tradesmen's Camp and Hotel Canberra have revealed numerous stone defined garden beds established by the men of No. 1. Here and there are other signs of occupation which include small pieces of rusting tins, wire left around a tree trunk, a few fragments of pottery and glass, and the now familiar drainage channels.

From the small fragments of glass found at Westlake I have discovered that the majority of men, and perhaps some ladies, preferred to drink beer, which came in brown glass bottles marked with the words "N.S.W. BOTTLE COMPANY LIMITED", and favoured amongst the cordials were "Commonwealth Cordial Company, Capital Cordial Company" and "Schweppes".

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There were two bottle surprises which indicate to me that a study of local cordial companies should be undertaken before this knowledge is lost. The bottles (broken) are a George Morton of Queanbeyan's "E. W. O'Sullivan Key Stone" which has a portrait of the man in a key stone shape. It was produced from 1910 in

memory of O'Sullivan, a local politician who worked to get the local area chosen as the site for the nation's capital. The other bottle, which dates from around the 1920s, has, in a circular motif, the words "PHILLIP RODIS - CAPITOL - QUEANBEYAN".

It is now fifty-four years since Marjie took me to school and over thirty since the last Westlake dwelling was removed. The area has been relatively untouched and presents a unique opportunity for those interested in the early history of our Territory to study the remains of over a century of temporary occupation.




