

1996/97 LANDCARE GRANTS

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
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THE SIR HAROLD & LADY WHITE GARDEN

Recently the ACT Government advertised their intention to remove the Sir Harold & Lady White Garden from the Interim ACT Heritage Places Register. Classified by the Trust in 1990, the garden has deteriorated since then and although the Committee recognises the difficulties of applying control to important gardens in private hands, it has expressed serious concern about de-listing. Many consider that a dangerous precedent is being set and that in future, owners who want to make changes which are currently not possible to a heritage site, will simply let the site deteriorate until it is inevitably de-listed.

Support for a formal appeal has been mixed, but the Classification Committee, with Council approval, has taken the unprecedented step of lodging an appeal to the Land and Planning Appeals Board. It was shortly after lodging this appeal that the Board was disbanded and the matter was heard at the end of January by the Administrative Appeals Tribunal. The AAT's findings will be notified in our May edition.



HOW FAR WE HAVE COME!

The Trust has recently put out this facsimile edition of the 1926 handbook which was published for public servants considering the move to the new Territory. This is a fascinating book full of interesting insights into the settlement that is barely recognisable as the city of Canberra today.

The book describes the available facilities for church services, schooling and sporting pursuits, details community groups, praises the rich soil of the area in which (they say) a wide variety of fine produce can be grown, and reassures the reader that the area is not overrun with snakes and other pests. Care is taken to assure readers about the climate as this was probably a cause of much trepidation to many moving from warmer coastal areas

The book includes floor plans for the range of houses then on offer by the Federal Capital Commission and dozens of photographs-one of almost every building in Canberra at that time!

The introduction is by John Butters, Chairman of the Federal Capital Commission.

The Trust was able to put out this reproduction due to the kindness of Mrs Lorna Marriott who lent the Trust her original copy of the book. Mrs Marriott was one of those who made the move to Canberra in the 1920s when her father, Mr Charles Francis, moved the family here to take up a position as Controller of Stores.


MOONTA MINES PUBLIC SCHOOL, MOONTA, SOUTH AUSTRALIA

Two hours from Adelaide on northern Yorke Peninsula lies Australia's 'copper triangle' - the area encompassing the three towns of Moonta, Kadina and Wallaroo. In the mid 19th century, this area generated more wealth than that from any other source in any of the Australian colonies. This mineral boom greatly helped the fledgling colony of South Australia's rapid expansion.

The Moonta Mines Public School building symbolises this 19th century mining boom and its associated wealth. This building was designed by contractors S. Rossiter and T. Davies who were mayors of Moonta and Wallaroo respectively. The school began its useful life in 1878 with over 650 pupils and finally closed as a school in 1968. The National Trust acquired the building soon after and it opened as a museum in 1970 housing displays of Cornish heritage and mining life.

Located next to the school, visitors can also tour the remains of the mine site and learn a little about the working life in the mines last century. Hourly afternoon train rides take visitors on a tour of the mine ruins and cemetery tours are available by request.

The museum is open on Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays from 1.30 - 4.00 and on school and public holidays. Located on Verran Terrace, enquiries may be made to the Old Sweet Shop on (08) 8825 3422. Several other Trust properties in the area may also be visited during what is a pleasant day trip from Adelaide. These include the Hughes Pump House, Miner's Cottage and Heritage Garden and the Local and Family Resource Centre in Moonta; Matta House near Kadina; and the Heritage and Nautical Museum in Wallaroo.



OVERSEAS NATIONAL TRUST PROPERTIES

MOTTISFONT ABBEY GARDEN, HAMPSHIRE

Mottisfont Abbey dates from the 12th century when it was built as an Augustinian Priory. Its name derives from the spring which is found on the land. After the Dissolution the Abbey was sold to lord Sandys, Lord Chamberlain to Henry VIII, who converted it into a private residence.

The grounds contain magnificent trees, walled gardens and are home to the national collection of old-fashioned roses. The site covers 809 hectares, much of this space devoted to agriculture, although there are some beautiful woodlands in which to enjoy a walk. The only parts of the Abbey open to the public are the drawing room which was decorated in *trompel'oeil* by Rex Whistler, and the old priory cellarium.

Features of the site are a shop where rose plants struck from those grown on site can be purchased, and open air events during the summer months. Lunches and teas are available in the Abbey and children's menus are served. Rooms in the Abbey are made available for conferences, seminars and weddings etc.

The rose garden is easily accessible by wheelchair and a braille guide to the roses is available. Dogs are not permitted outside the car park. The Abbey is located 4.5 miles northwest of Romney. The nearest station is Dunbridge Station. For more information on coming events etc., contact (01372) 451596.

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RECENT CLASSIFICATIONS

Late last year the Trust classified two endangered species sites (at Red Hill and Stirling Park) and the State Circle Cutting and Capital Hill Unconformity.

The State Circle Cutting and Capital Hill Unconformity are judged to be of considerable scientific, educational and historical value. They both display angular unconformities which, at each locality, separate different successions of strata and which hold the key to an understanding of the early geological history of the Canberra district. The sites are also of geological interest in interpreting the geological history of adjacent areas in eastern Australia and also in other parts of the world (i.e. Quidong near Cooma and Llandovery in Wales).

The extensive outcrop and clear display of geological features at the State Circle Cutting, and the three-dimensional view presented by the smaller outcrop under Parliament House, make these sites ideal for educational instruction and learning for school and university students as well as for the general public.

The Stirling Park and Red Hill Endangered Plant Sites are significant for the plant *Rutidosis leptorrhynchoides*. This is a button wrinklewort, a slender or bushy perennial 25-35cms in height which produces orange/yellow flowers from October to April. The Stirling Park site supports the largest known colony of *Rutidosis leptorrhynchoides* in the ACT, and two smaller colonies are to be found on Red Hill.

CELEBRATIONS AT COOMA COTTAGE

The month of March will be a busy one for Cooma Cottage as the town of Yass celebrates the 200th anniversary of Hamilton Hume's birth. Throughout March Cooma Cottage will host an exhibition of work from the Canberra Spinners and weavers Association. This exhibition promises to be very interesting with static displays and spinning demonstrations throughout the weekend of 22 and 23 March, during the Pride of Erin Festival.

The Pride of Erin Festival this year focuses on the achievements of Hamilton Hume as a great Australian pioneer and explorer. NATIONAL MUSEUM SITE

In the 1970s the then Interim Council of the NMA considered ten sites. In 1982 Yarramundi was announced as best option. The Council cogently and convincingly set out the rationale for this in its 1982 report. This choice remains a sound one given the concept of the museum as one moving away from the traditional mausoleum style building. Yarramundi offers the space and right environment in which to develop a museum and AIATSIS facility which will be interactive.

Yarramundi will allow development that is environmentally sensitive and in which the correct cultural and landscape context can be formulated. It suits Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal Australian needs as convincingly predicated by the Interim Council. No arguments since then to change the site have been convincing.

The facilities require ample space. Neither Acton nor Kingston are adequate. To place the facilities here would be to squeeze and constrict them. Yarramundi spatially and conceptually will allow interaction between indoor and outdoor displays. Additionally King's Park is part of a public domain and essential setting to Lake Burley Griffin which should not be alienated by a development of this nature. It is also hemmed in in such a way that parking would be an issue, unless large parts of the park were lost to parking. The sound of the nearby Carillon wafting across the site would hardly be conducive to the indoor-outdoor concept of the museum which is still highly appropriate.

The Parliamentary foreshore zone is wholly unacceptable. It has developed its own heritage values as an open space of immense dignity and meaning, flanked by symbolic public institutional buildings (with one glaring exception). Additionally, it simply is too small for the modern concept of a museum. It is not the sort of facility that matches the

style of building in the area. Do we really want the landscape vista interrupted by buildings? The answer is unequivocally NO.

There appears to be a view, and therefore objections to the site, that Yarramundi is off the tourist track and isolated. Given the road system, this can only be regarded as preposterous and an extraordinary viewpoint not supported by fact. It is only 5kms from Parliament House, adjacent to the access to Black Mountain Tower and the botanic gardens, adjacent to the National Aquarium, Scrivener Damand the Lookout over Government House, adjacent to excellent road access and the tourist route to Tidbinbilla, the Cotter and other outlying sites. Car parking can be adequately provided at the site.

It is noted that the Site Selection Advisory Committee is not considering the concept of the museum. Nevertheless the concept and the right site are inseparable. The Piggott Committee's innovative view of the Museum and its interaction between Aboriginal Australia, non-Aboriginal cultural and social history, and environmental concerns remains entirely sound. The Trust supports this original vision and the choice of Yarramundi which resulted from an exhaustive search and participation of interested parties. Yarramundi and the museum concept remain symbiotically joined.

We understand that with the exception of sewerage facilities, all essential services are available. The style of buildings proposed for the Yarramundi site would offset some of the sewerage costs. But is a question of sewers seriously to be seen as significant in such a decision as where to site such an important national facility?

70th ANNIVERSARY OLD PARLIAMENT HOUSE

COWRA CREEK AND OTHER GHOST TOWNS

About twenty to thirty minutes off the Monaro Highway east of Bredbo are the remains of two townships, at least one of which, in its hey day, was probably bigger in population than Bredbo. The earliest town was known as Cowra Creek. Together with nearby Fiery Creek and Macanally, it was an active gold mining community between the years 1888 to 1910. Exact population numbers are uncertain but, going by the school enrolments, Cowra Creek would have had, for most of this period, somewhere between 100 and 200 persons.

Cowra Creek was isolated and bereft of many of the conveniences that were taken as given elsewhere in rural Australia. The government presence was barely visible bar for the school, which did not open until 1895 and a postal service. There was, however, a bakery, butchery, store, hotel and a recreation ground which was used for picnics and cricket, the slowly deteriorating concrete pitch being now the only witness to these events. The cricket matches were often followed by a good fight or two, the participants afterwards repairing to the hotel.

Social events such as picnics and balls were held frequently and attracted visitors from surrounding villages and farms. A hall was erected for use as a church, however the clergy rarely visited and it was used more for social functions. There was for a time a Cowra Creek Dramatic Club and a minstrel troupe to assist in these matters, and when there was a concert, Mrs Murray's small piano, her most precious possession, was borrowed and carried over Cowra Creek to the hall by four men. The Murray family were one of the mainstays of the field, John Murray leaving a successful retail business in Sydney to commence mining at Michelago before moving to Cowra Creek. When the family eventually left Cowra Creek they moved to Glebe Farm in Canberra.

The physical environment was harsh. Periods of prolonged dry were frequent, with often little fodder available for the cartage teams and little water for the townsfolk or batteries. Winters were very cold and with heavy rain the tracks were impassable, the community often being isolated because of flooded streams and creeks. At such times illness was common, particularly among the children.

By 1910 the goldfield and township were abandoned, beaten not so much by the lack of ore but rather by technology and a lack of capital. The refractory nature of ore meant that it had to be trucked as far as Newcastle for processing, an expensive process that could not be justified unless yields were very high. The later years could not have been particularly happy ones, with many old time residents packing up and leaving. When the store and pub were under the same roof, the storekeeper would lie on the bench in front of the bar waiting for the "rare customer".

Fortunately, there is much that remains as evidence of this period. The site of the township remains intact and the hotel and bakery can be readily identified. A battery site is located nearby on Cowra Creek itself. The remains of the school building are located on Back Creek. Further up Back Creek is a battery site with a boiler still in situ. In an adjacent gully are the remains of mines and battery sites dating from this period. Both the Macanally and Fiery Creek mine and battery sites are still substantially intact. On the former a boiler is still in place and on the latter the remains of a large stone built dam. The remains of bush huts are still evident, at least two of these having substantial stone chimney remains.

In 1933 the Cowra Creek field was reported to be again the scene of mining activity after "abandonment for about forty years". BHP eventually purchased the various leases in 1938, relocating the site of the town on a ridge several kilometres from its predecessor, and renaming it "Cowarra". The sale of leases to BHP was an occasion for very considerable rejoicing on the part of the leaseholders, one of whom stated that they were now part of a very select band of men that had made money from gold mining, and in this case with not very much effort.

The similarity between community life during this period and that of a generation or more before was striking, with the obvious difference, however, that there was more money around and the advent of the motor vehicle eased some of the transport difficulties. There was a Cowra Creek Progress Association and euchre parties and socials were regular weekly events. By 1938 there was a butcher's shop and boarding house, but it was not until October 1939 that a general store was opened. In that month there

was a good attendance at the dance and social, a feature of which was a Mr Irons playing the piano while standing on his head!

By early 1940 there was still, however, no post office or school, the local correspondent stating that it seemed "... almost unbelievable that a village with a population of over 200 [was] still without postal facilities. What will happen when we ask for a school?" The post office was eventually opened in February 1940, but the school was not opened until March 1941. A bush nurse arrived in November 1940. There was still, however, no telephone connection and the poor state of the two access tracks to the Cooma road impeded traffic, the main track being closed when the Bredbo River was up following heavy rains.

The mine was in active production from 1940 to 1942, producing a very creditable 14,676 oz. during this period. The mine closed down in 1942 due to the shortage of fresh water in the mine dam and a general shortage of labour, a consequence of the World War. A skeleton staff, engaged in maintenance, was employed for the remainder of the War years.

According to Ted Hayden, who was a fitter at the power house and the last of the BHP caretakers, there was no hotel and liquor was not sold on site, the men travelling to Bredbo for their beverages. Judging by the numbers of bottles left on site this was done reasonably frequently.


The change rooms at the Ridge were never used for their original purpose, but as an amenities and gambling room, two up being a favourite pastime, even though such pursuits were illegal.

Physically, Cowarra town is still substantially intact. The foundations of many buildings can be clearly seen. Many of the houses were built on stone packed embankments on the side of the ridge, and the house sites are clearly visible. The street layout can also be followed, and the concrete floor for the change rooms is still in place.

From a heritage viewpoint, the Cowra Creek settlements have few equals in this region. There has been some damage over the years from prospecting companies and the more recent post BHP mining operations which have also left a pollution legacy in the main mine area. However, the isolation of Cowra Creek and the scattered nature of many of the satellite settlements, for example those at Fiery Creek and Macanally, has helped keep their integrity intact.


Ted Hayden (left) and Alf Knitter, caretakers in the 1940s & 1990s respectively, on the site of the old power house.





GLIMPSES OF EARLY CANBERRA

KLENSENDORLFFE'S LAND (PART 2)

Last issue's article began the story of Klensendorlffe's land: how William Klensendorlffe came to the region; his time at the farm; and the story of the Mowle family who took over the land and remained at the farm until 1852. We continue the story of this parcel of land with the tenants who inhabited the land from the mid 1800s.

On the western side of Kaye's Farm was the tenant farm known as Briar. It had a succession of tenants, the earliest of whom were probably James Devaney followed by the two Naughton brothers. By the mid to late 1870s the Kinleyside connection with the farm had begun. This connection continued until 1913.

The Kinleysides travelled to Sydney from Scotland on board the *Hero*, arriving in 1839. They settled in Ashfield where they established a successful blacksmithing business. In 1858 they moved to the Canberra district. It is probable that a widowed daughter, Alison Willis, and her five-year-old daughter came with them. She was the first Kinleyside to live at Briar Farm and was in residence by mid February 1879 when her sister, Mary, married George Shakespeare Johns at Briar Farm.

Whether Alison moved into Briar Farm as Mrs Thomas Bryant (married 1869) or Mrs James William Cook (married 1877 following the death of Bryant in May, 1876) is not known. Both husbands were partners in bricklaying and in Briar Farm¹. The last members of the Kinleyside family to work the farm were Alison's daughter, Elizabeth, and son-in-law Thomas Kinleyside. Thomas was Elizabeth's cousin and the

couple married at St John the Baptist Church on 26 April, 1882.

When Elizabeth and Thomas took over the lease from Alison and James Cook is not known. All Elizabeth and Thomas' children were born at Briar Farm which suggests that they were there by 1883, or that Grannie Cook may have been a midwife. Thomas and Elizabeth Kinleyside left the farm towards the end of 1913. A few months earlier in April, Alison died at Briar Farm and in July, Esma Doreen, Alison's great-grand-daughter, was born in the old farm house.

In his unpublished history of the Kinleyside family, Peter Kimber has written about the homes of Elizabeth and Thomas Kinleyside:

The family lived for a time at Glebe Farm (Glebe Park, City), a long narrow section of land that extended from the top end of Coranderrk Street, Reid, down to a frontage to the Molonglo River and was granted to the Rector of St John's by various members of the Campbell family who owned the land . . . In his notebook for 1894 Thomas' address was given as Triangle Poultry Farm, Canberra and this may have been on the Yass Queanbeyan Road near where the ABC studios now stands, or at Briar Farm near Lotus Bay, Yarralumla, but some family members lived on the southern side of the Molonglo River in front of where the National Library is today . . .

During their years at Briar Farm, Thomas and Elizabeth bred horses and kept poultry and bees. Thomas



repaired farm machinery for others and Elizabeth was responsible for hen setting and worked as a seamstress. Thomas died on 14 October, 1915 at Oaks Estate. He was only fifty-nine years of age. His obituary appeared in the 2 November, 1915 issue of *The Navvy*. In part it reads:

The deceased was an ardent reformer and agitator and was always found fighting for justice for his fellow men. His contributions to the press during many years were a valuable help to the labour movement and his topical verses written under the name of "Jingler" were greatly appreciated by a large circle of readers. His contributions to The Navvy since its inception were greatly appreciated, no matter what side of the question he took up, as it was recognised by his friends and opponents that he sought the truth and thus helped to solve the great problems facing the labour movement. Comrade Kinleyside was for some years District Secretary at the Federal area and during his terms of office he carried out his duties in a conscientious manner; and he also represented his branch at several conferences of the Association . . .

Following the departure of the Kinleyside family the size of Briar Farm was gradually reduced until, by 1927 when taken over by Charles Foster Day, it consisted of only four acres. The depletion began in 1913 when Charles Kaye leased twenty acres of Briar farm. In 1921 he increased his holdings by a further fifty acres¹. The last cull occurred from 1922 when the settlements of Westlake were erected.

Briar Farm, once part of Klensendorlffe land has now shrunk to the small area of bushland we now know as Stirling Park. What is its future? In recent years the NCPA put forward a proposal that it be used for medium density housing and a site near the Sewer Vent has been designated for the new Prime Minister's Lodge.

This land is in the middle of Canberra and easily accessible to those who do not own motor vehicles. It has no neatly cut lawns or flowers grown in symmetrical rows. If William Klensendorlffe, Stewart Mowle or Thomas Kinleyside wandered this land today each would recognize, amongst the new growth, a few old trees and well defined landforms.

Today's visitor can wander amongst the grasses, fallen leaves, mossy rocks and wildflowers where they can observe, smell and listen to the rich treasures of the park, including the rare daisy button (winklewort), wild bees, black cockatoos, kookaburras, a kangaroo family, spiny anteaters, large lizards, wonderful multicoloured spiders and a few snakes.





MILITARY EXPANSION A THREAT

The government has plans to expand military activity around the Beecroft Peninsula (listed on the Register of the National Estate and a sacred site of the local Aboriginals) at Jervis Bay. Increased military activity may well endanger plant and animal life on both land and water. Presently there is military testing on the site for four months of every year and not only Australian, but the US and New Zealand military are involved. The new proposal is to launch rocket-boosted vertical takeoff planes towing targets to be fired on from ships out at sea. The hot rocket casings pose a fire risk to native vegetation and debris will land on the ocean floor. The resultant disturbance and pollution could pose a serious threat to the unique habitat that is the Beecroft Peninsula.
