GOYDER'S DAY 2017

Despite the threat of heavy monsoonal rain about 40 persons attended the Goyder's Day 2017 commemoration on Sunday 5th February at the Roadmasters House Museum.

National Trust Northern Territory President Trevor Horman opened the procedings with an outline of the significance of the Goyder's Day. He explained that George Woodroffe Goyder arrived in Port Darwin on 5 February 1869 in charge of 130 personnel to survey land to establish a settlement that subsequently has evolved into the City of Darwin. Trevor gave an insight into the character of Goyder who served as Surveyor-General of South Australia for 32 years where he was highly regarded as an inspiring leader and able public servant.



Roadmasters House Museum Manager/Curator Trevor Menzies followed with a talk on how the survey was carried out and what was achieved. Over a 7-month period the expedition surveyed some 2,500 lots in 4 townsites and some 2,200 rural sections over an area of 2,600 square kilometres. He said that it was an incredible achievement given that the job was completed in such a short time over unknown territory and under pretty harsh conditions. He added that even today with GPS, electronic measuring equipment, chain saws and 4WD vehicles the feat would be regarded as a real achievement. Trevor advised the audience that the museum upstairs had a good display of maps, photos and instruments relating to the Goyder survey expedition.

In introducing Sarah from the Top End Native Plants Society, Trevor Menzies said that the expedition was not entirely about surveying. Sarah informed the audience that the expedition party included naturalists Alfred and Frederick Schultze who collected and identified many specimens of the local flora and fauna. Surgeon's assistant William Webster Hoare who was a talented artist assisted the Schultzes in documenting their collection. Hoare made watercolour sketches of the specimens, and the Top End Native Plants Society holds prints of these. Many of the prints were on display at the museum, which created quite a bit of interest from the audience.

The program of activities for the day was supposed to conclude with a guided walk from Roadmasters House to Goyder Park in the Waterfront Precinct. Goyder Park was opened on Goyder's Day 2016 and commemorates the site of the Goyder's main base camp that subsequently became the first permanent settlement on Port Darwin. Unfortunately the rain intervened so the walk had to be cancelled. This gave the audience more time to enjoy the refreshments and inspect the museum.

Despite the inclement weather that affected the numbers and the program, the 2017 event was another successful and enjoyable Goyder's Day commemoration hosted by the National Trust Northern Territory.
