Communiqué of the Independent Forum on the Review of the NSW Heritage Act: 9 June 2021

OVERVIEW

- 1. An INDEPENDENT FORUM of 277 experts, professional heritage organisations, community groups, individuals and National Trust members was hosted by the National Trust of Australia (NSW) with support from Australia ICOMOS, the Australasian Society for Historical Archaeology, Australian Archaeological Association, the Historic Houses Association and Engineering Heritage Australia on 9th June 2021 in RESPONSE to the Parliamentary Review of the NSW Heritage Act, 1977.
- 2. The Forum was aimed at **GENERATING** cross-industry collaboration to discuss key issues facing NSW's heritage, to develop key responses to the Review's Discussion Paper and to **IDENTIFY** what elements are necessary for a Heritage Act to be robust, comprehensive and effective.
- 3. The Forum **RECOGNISED** the significant contribution that cultural heritage places make to our identity, creating a sense of place and representing the State's story, its people and its shared connections.
- 4. The Forum highlighted the **IMPORTANT** role cultural heritage places have in domestic and international tourism and their **CONTRIBUTION** to a vibrant state economy.
- 5. The Forum EXPRESSED CONCERN that a major review of existing historic heritage legislation had been proposed at a time when a twenty-year promise to enact independent Indigenous heritage legislation has not been fulfilled. There was CONSENSUS that contemporary legislation to protect and conserve Indigenous Heritage must remain a PRIORITY over amending heritage legislation.

THE REVIEW

- 6. The Forum **AFFIRMED** the fundamental importance of the role of the *Heritage Act,* 1977 to identify, protect, promote and conserve cultural heritage places in NSW and **IDENTIFIED** the following issues as **CRITICAL** to the success of the Review:
 - Any proposed amendments should result in BETTER HERITAGE OUTCOMES, rather than a weakening of heritage protection.



- While the Heritage Act and its regulations may benefit from small updates and amendments, its OBJECTIVES AND PRINCIPLES remain APPROPRIATE AND RELEVANT.
- That cultural heritage is at IMMENSE RISK from State Significant
 Developments, which effectively TURN OFF and OVERRIDE the provisions of
 the Heritage Act, 1977.
- Greater RESOURCING to enable the Act's effective implementation is FUNDAMENTAL, so that Heritage NSW can show LEADERSHIP, effectively IDENTIFY the state's heritage places, and manage their SYMPATHETIC CHANGE.
- Heritage is a SHARED RESPONSIBILITY, involving government at all levels, owners, corporations and community groups to identify, protect, conserve, present, and transmit the state's HERITAGE VALUES to future generations.
- The NSW Heritage Council should be an INDEPENDENT PUBLIC CHAMPION
 of heritage comprised largely of RECOGNISED HERITAGE EXPERTS and
 organisational representatives.
- Government agencies should be EXEMPLARY OWNERS AND MANAGERS of cultural heritage assets and need to resource their respective heritage maintenance and management role, and TAKE RESPONSIBILITY for the cultural heritage of STATE SIGNIFICANT places.
- Support for LOCAL GOVERNMENT is VITAL for adequate identification, protection and conservation of the state's 40,000+ locally listed heritage places.
- The process of IDENTIFYING and LISTING cultural heritage places should be separate from the process of MANAGING CHANGE at cultural heritage places.
 It should NOT INTRODUCE further categories of places.
- The Heritage Act does not prevent sympathetic re-use of heritage places. When applied well, it ENHANCES strong economic development and delivers good heritage outcomes.
- Owners of heritage places should receive useful ADVICE, effective FINANCIAL INCENTIVES and adequate CONSERVATION GRANTS to ensure well informed ownership of heritage places leads to desirable outcomes.
