

McCrae Education Program

Discover a unique experience at the McCrae Homestead by exploring the parallel experiences of the McCrae family and the Bunurong community in the mid-1800s. This cross-cultural program has been co-designed by the Bunurong Land Council Aboriginal Corporation and the National Trust.

Interpreted through Georgiana McCrae's personal diaries, her son George McCrae's diary accounts, family letters, sketches and paintings, the program shares what is anecdotally considered a mutually respectful relationship between the Bunurong people and the McCrae family.

MELBOURNE HISTORIC CRIME AND JUSTICE PRECINCT

Located in the heart of the Melbourne CBD, the NTV's Melbourne Historic Crime and Justice Precinct includes the Old Melbourne Goal, the Watch House, the Court House, and a walking tour of the surrounding landscape.

Together, these buildings provide a unique insight into the social, political and legislative changes within Victoria from 1839 to late 1900s. Students will learn about a prisoner's journey from admission at the Watch House, their trial and, in many cases, incarceration.

The Old Melbourne Gaol

Learn about Melbourne's complex criminal and justice history with our experienced eduators. Together we explore the nuanced stories of Aboriginal prisoners Tunnerminnawait and Maulboyheener, wrongfully convicted Colin Campbell Ross and bushranger Ned Kelly. We will also investigate the social context of women and children within the goal through a series of new interpretive installations.

The Watch House

The City Watch House was the point of transition for entry into the justice system from 1913 to 1994. Incarcerated within its walls were an ever-changing community of individuals charged with offences ranging from public drunkenness to murder.

Students actively explore this confronting place from several different perspectives through role-play, multimedia interpretation and self-exploration.

The Watch House is an authentic environment left largely unchanged since the last police and inmates left in 1994. Students will encounter stories, places and imagery that are both challenging and informative, encouraging deep experiential leaning about complex social, political and historical issues.

Court Room Drama

The Old Magistrates' Court includes the original Supreme Court of Victoria where Ned Kelly was found guilty of murder by Sir Redmond Barry in 1880.

This significant heritage building offers students an engaging and revealing insight into past and contemporary Victorian legal processes. Students can participate and run their own realistic trial based on real cases by taking all the court roles from prosecution to judge to defendant.

A choice of historical and contemporary trials allow students to engage with a range of complex legal and ethical issues including sexting, culpable driving and social justice. Each session includes discussion time for students to weigh evidence, debate and come to their own judgement and outcomes.

Rippon Lea House and Gardens is one of the largest surviving nineteenth century grand suburban estates in Australia and was included on Australia's premiere heritage listing, the National Heritage list, in 2006.

Our primary education program at Rippon Lea Estate focuses on experiential learning, examining the past through family histories, schooling and domestic work. They include hands on learning with toys, games, sports, period clothes and through the exploration of the 5.7-hectare property. The tour of the mansion provides insight into its residents through time, exploring their stories, artefacts, furnishings, fashion and images through interactive interpretation.

Once the grand city residence of the Armytage family, Como House and Garden in South Yarra lets students imagine the world of the 1800 and gain insight into history at a family and community level.

This program examines the past through family history, children's life, schooling and domestic work. It includes toys, games, sports, period clothes and exploration activities.

Our educators take on the roles of 19th century Housekeeper and Butler as they lead students through the day on a range of hands on activities.

These include:

- Traditional dancing in the ballroom
- Exploring the stories of the house
- Introduction to Melbourne in the past

MRS SARGOOD INCURSION

Bringing History to your Classroom.

In this incursion, Mrs Sargood, mother of 10, society matron and home school teacher from 1885, visits your class to take students back to a Victorian era classroom where manners, etiquette and discipline ruled.

This exciting learning experience encourages inquiry, discussion and old fashioned fun.

Student activities include:

- Testing writing skills with the use of nib pens and ink wells (Level 2 and above)
- Learning about expected student behaviour and the rules of a Victorian classroom,
- Exploring and discussing what school life is like now compared to the past

Ship Shape - Primary Program

Ahoy! Step lively aboard a real 19th century tall ship and into the lives of the sailors who lived and worked aboard. A First Mate guides students around the cargo ship, showing them the ropes of life at sea.

The program includes a range of hands-on activities, from using the capstan, ringing the bell on watch, trying out the bunks in the Liverpool deckhouse, furling sails on a spar, scrubbing decks and trying your hand as the helmsman at the wheel.

The session includes entry to the Polly Woodside gallery and film theatre which presents the hardships of life at sea and screens the voyage of George Andrews, the ship's carpenter in 1904.

Survival at Sea - Secondary Program

The Polly Woodside is more than a floating museum. It is an adventure with all the drama of a perilous sea voyage.

It is a story about transport, mateship, changing technology, social norms, respect and trade. The program allows students to step back in time to gain first-hand insight into the unique experience of these isolated, seafaring communities.

The program includes:

- Importance of sailing to Australia's maritime history and the role of the Polly Woodside.
- Conditions for sailors and daily life aboard a ship.
- Video of George Andrews depicting the reality of life aboard.
- Learning terms used by sailors and shipboard language.
- Identifying parts of the ship.
- Shipboard Maths: the ship's time system and different watches.
- Ship hierarchy system.
- Captains quarters and the role of navigation.

The program also includes digital online resources and student activities to support learning back in the classroom.

ARCHAEOLOGY

The history of the Australian people extends to at least 65,000 years ago; of this long and diverse history, only 0.4% is recorded in written records. Archaeology – the excavation, analysis and interpretation of material culture from the past – therefore plays an integral role in understanding our national story. Utilising experiential 'hands on' and object-based learning, our incursion and excursion programs help students and teachers to better understand this exciting discipline.

Developed by archaeologists in close collaboration with primary and secondary teachers, our curriculum-linked incursion and excursion programs are suitable for primary, secondary and VCE students. Each program is supported by a comprehensive resource package for teachers, including lesson plans, teacher's notes, glossary and worksheets.



Understanding Archaeological Thinking

People have been in Australia for at least 65,000 years. We know quite a lot about communities in the past – their technologies, food, resources and culture. But how do we know these things? This unique incursion experience introduces younger students to archaeological thinking, exploring the ways that archaeologists use the everyday objects of the past to travel through time and space to investigate people of the past and the landscapes that they lived in.

Supporting resources for teachers are embedded within the program, including pre and post-excursion activities, notes and professional development content.

Time Detectives

This program has been designed to link specifically into the Level 7 and 8 Historical Knowledge units focussed on the nature of sources about Australia's past, their conservation and impact within contemporary society. We explore the different ways that archaeologists reconstruct the lives of past people and landscapes, from traditional approaches to cutting-edge techniques. The strong links between people and landscapes, from deep time through to today, also makes this program highly relevant to the Level 7 and 8 geography and science curricula. As a result, the program is offered under several modes: multidisciplinary, or discipline specific within the subjects of history, geography and science.

Supporting resources for teachers are embedded within the program, including pre and post-excursion activities, notes and professional development content.

From Custodianship to the Anthropocene: reconstructing past landscape interactions

People have always had an intimate link to the landscapes in which they live. Our environments have provided us with food, shelter, clothing, resources and cultural connectivity for millennia, and continue to do so today. In Australia, this connection extends to at least 65,000 years; as a result, 99.6% of this record can only be explored through archaeological evidence. In this module, designed specifically for Unit 3 in VCE Australian History, we explore different approaches to recovering, analysing and understanding the record across the period of Custodianship to the Anthropocene: 60,000 to 2010, including environmental archaeology, zooarchaeology and materials analysis.

This program also includes a suite of supporting resources for teachers, supporting their professional development on archaeological thinking.

Pentridge Prison

Established in 1851 and closing in 1997, Pentridge Prison is a heritage listed former state prison that has undergone adaptive reuse over the last decade. Following the closure of the Old Melbourne Goal in the 1920s, Pentridge became the primary remand centre for metropolitan Melbourne. The long history of the site and the changing social, political and legal circumstances of the people who both worked and were incarcerated within its walls are the foci of a new educational program by NTV Education.

Commencing in late Term 2, 2023, these programs are aligned with the Victorian curriculum for history, legal studies and sociology. Our education programs utilise the latest in immersive technologies, including soundscapes and audio-visual displays. Students will hear recorded interviews with past inmates, guards and lawyers and can observe artefacts dating between the early 1800s to late 1900s.

NTV is a leader in the delivery of experiential learning: learning through seeing, doing and feeling, connecting different knowledge centres created across a person's life. The NTV Education programs at Pentridge Prison provide a unique opportunity to move beyond the theoretical approach to learning and experience the setting and implications of social, economic and environmental change borne out in our shifting legal system through time.



Secondary History and Civics and Citizenship

The subject focus of this program is Civics and Citizenship and History, discussed through the curriculum themes of Government and Democracy and Laws and Citizens. This program is suitable for students in Year Levels 7 to 10. The program explores the changing nature of law, justice and freedom, and how each of these concepts is defined by the society in which they were, and are, enacted. As a society and culture change over time, so do their perceptions of what is right and just, influencing the appropriate scale of punishment for different crimes.

VCE Sociology and Legal Studies

This program is designed around the VCE Study Design for Legal Studies, linking in to Unit 2 of the Sociology program. The Legal Studies Study Design – Unit 1: guilt and liability, Unit 2: sanctions and remedies, Unit 3: rights and justice and Unit 4: the people and the law – comprehensively linking to the Pentridge Prison site and its history. Unit 2 in the Sociology VCE program runs parallel to this, exploring deviance and crime and its implications.

The program is flexible and could be taken either as a single visit at any point in the year, or as a returning program featuring multiple visits to address different aspects of the site. As students move through the curriculum for these Study Designs, they explore content such as legal frameworks, changing concepts of guilt and innocence, sanctions and rights.

VCE History

The Pentridge Prison site lends itself towards a VCE level History education program, linked to the unit on Power and Resistance (1788 – 1913). Students explore the complex, dynamic history between power and resistance across this time period, and the prison, with operations across 1851 to 1997, will allow students to have tangible experiences with real-world implications. The emphasis within the curriculum on the history of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples linked to power and resistance can also be uniquely explored at the Pentridge site, and linked in to other NTV properties such as the Old Melbourne Gaol and the city watch house.

Historic (and in many examples, still contemporary) issues such as struggles for improved workers' rights and conditions, the push for women's equality and demands for LGBTIQA+ rights can be actively addressed at the Pentridge Prison site, linked to the increasing awareness and acceptance of social movements and protests as a feature of Australian democracy.
