2023 Victorian Tree of the Year

The Mount Alexandra Shire Council area is well known for its magnificent trees and again the area has won the National Trust's 2023 Tree of the Year. It also won the 2021 Tree of the Year being an English Oak Quercus Robur being located in the Castlemaine Botanic Gardens.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE: This tree is of state significance as an outstanding example of a mature River Red Gum, being one of the largest River Red Gums in Victoria (cf. the Bilston Tree).

NOTES: This is one of the largest River Red Gums in Victoria (cf. the Bilston Tree). The tree is well-known and its direction has been signposted on the Midlands Highway. It contains a small amount of deadwood and several cavities but is generally in excellent condition. The tree has a large natural branch graft on its northern side. The tree is of State significance and is an outstanding example of a mature River Red Gum.

The Branch is seeking some volunteers to assist with activating *History & Heritage* on social media to publicise heritage issues to communities throughout the region. They will be part of the Editorial Committee but will use their skills to launch new advocacy sites.

Branch Submission to Greater Bendigo's Draft Heritage Strategy

The Branch commends and thanks the City of Greater Bendigo for preparing the Draft Heritage Strategy that, "has been designed to outline the City's heritage priorities over the next four years."

Engaging the community will further add to the work of the staff and broaden the actions already contained in the draft Strategy. You can read the full submission here

The Branch has put forward a series of recommendations to Council to be considered for inclusion in the Strategy. Here they are-

Knowing Our Heritage

- That Council continues its Heritage Studies during 2024-2028 but with more community education, consultation and participation.
- That Council immediately advocates for State Government funding to undertake the necessary Heritage Studies so that planning applications are not held up and the information is available to those involved.

Protecting Our Heritage

- That Council develop a Plan for Pall Mall by the end of 2024 which studies those buildings that require
 repurposing, ways to increase foot traffic and reduce vehicle numbers, and increase business activity in
 the precinct.
- That Council investigates their Local Laws in 2024 to include measures that will reduce 'Demolition by Neglect' of heritage properties throughout Greater Bendigo.
- That Council takes further steps to protect the Big Hill Range and Mandurang Valley Landscape in 2024 by taking steps to implement a Planning Scheme Amendment.

Supporting Our Heritage

- Council explores ways in 2024 to retain residential occupancy in heritage buildings in and around CBDs and hospital precincts.
- That Council reaffirm its support of the 'The World Heritage Bid for the Victorian Goldfields' in
 partnership with other local Councils and the State and Federal Governments so it is completed by 2027
 in this Strategy.
- That Council progress actions in the Strategy that are related to the Greater Bendigo Planning Scheme to amendment stage during 2024-2028.

Promoting Our Heritage

 Over the next four years Council publish a six-monthly Strategy Bulletin describing the action taken and progress in relation to this Strategy.

- That Council convene a consultation session early in 2024 before the Strategy is finalised engaging a range of stakeholders and the community and for it to invite speakers to contribute to the discussion.
- Actively promote the City's Heritage Design Guidelines over the period of the Strategy.

Long Gully Uniting Church and Sunday School - follow up from Heritage Victoria on last month's story

'Thank you for your email - we will log this as a new case. All our new cases are triaged to determine next steps, and factors such as harm to the heritage place/object, conduct of owners, and public realm issues are considered when determining prioritisation.

I note your invitation to meet with your branch when coming to Bendigo - we will aim to factor this into a future site visit. I also note your offer of assistance. We are currently working with the Heritage Council of

Victoria, an independent statutory authority, to look at how private owners can be incentivised to care for their heritage spaces - the Sampson Family Cottage is being considered as part of this initial work. It may be that partnerships with community organisations such as the National Trust are explored as part of any incentives model. I will keep you updated as this work progresses.

We are very appreciative of you drawing our attention to the condition of the Long Gully Uniting Church & Sunday School. The <u>Heritage Council of Victoria</u> wants to hear what kind of heritage is important to you, and whether it is reflected in the Victorian Heritage Register. This is your opportunity to help shape the Victorian Heritage Register over the coming decade.

What is the Victorian Heritage Register?

The <u>Victorian Heritage Register</u> is a statutory list that provides legal protection for heritage places and objects that are significant to the history and development of the State of Victoria. The 2,400 listings can be viewed online, and include places and objects associated with important events and communities in Victoria's history. Registrations include the <u>Shrine of Remembrance</u>, the <u>Eureka Flag</u>, the <u>Former Aboriginal Church of Christ</u>, the <u>Former Benalla Migrant Camp</u>, architecturally significant buildings like the <u>Olympic Swimming Stadium</u>, and places of archaeological significance like the <u>Ellen Kelly Homestead Site</u>. The Victorian Heritage Register was established in 1974 and is administered under the *Heritage Act 2017*.

Why is the Victorian Heritage Register important?

The Victorian Heritage Register recognises and protects our state significant heritage for future generations to enjoy. Through the protection and conservation of our shared heritage, Victorians can learn more about our history and the development of our communities today. Places and objects in the Victorian Heritage Register are of state-level cultural heritage significance. This means that they must be of importance to Victoria's history (rather than a single local area) and represent a key, outstanding or rare aspect of our state's heritage.

How to obtain property titles

For all sorts of reasons property titles can be quite complex and working through them can, at times, be as much art as science. The following example is what is commonly found however some situations can be quite complex, too complex to cover here.

Current and historical titles to a property can be obtained in two ways, either free through the Public Records Office Victoria (PROV) or purchased through LANDATA (https://www.landata.online/)



To obtain titles from LANDATA <u>open their web site</u> and click on 'Titles & property certificates'. This takes you to step one, specifying the property you want the title for. If you know the volume and folio number of the property that is the best search criteria to use, and it will go straight to the purchase page. If this is not known the street address is often used. Whichever search option you chose click on it and further options will become available. Fill this section with as much of the requested information as possible and click 'next'.

Generally, there will be an option to 'View and confirm on map'. It is best to use this to confirm that you are investigating the correct block of land. In the case of my property, and this can be true for many others, the map highlights a small sliver of land at the rear of my block. If this occurs, click on the portion of the map that contains the building you are interested in to ensure you have the correct title. In my case the sliver was added to the original title in the past. Once the correct block of land is identified on the map click 'Confirm Property Detail' to go back one step and click 'Confirm Property Detail' again.

This opens a page where you can select the certificate you are after. There are various options available, for historical searches the 'Title History Search Statement' is usually the best option. In a number of the selection options, it will automatically include the 'Land Index Search' selection as well. This is the fee to search for the Volume and Folio number of the title, which is criteria all titles are filed under. If you used the Volume and Folio number at the start this fee will not be charged. Note that this document does not always include a copy of the title plan, so if this is required click the 'Copy of Plan' box as well. In most cases the plan is not needed at this stage.

Once all documents required are selected click on 'Next' at the bottom of the page.

At this stage the site will ask you to Register or Login. If you are not registered do so at this point, if registered login. Once you login you are taken to the 'Delivery Details' page. Fill this and click 'Next' to go to the payment page. Enter your details and click Next. Your receipt appears on the next page. Go to the email account you used in your login and the receipt will appear there. This will be followed by another email a short time later with a copy of the title.

At this point there can be quite a difference in the details contained in the document you receive. In almost, if not all cases, the first page will be typed. This will show the current owner and any changes to the title, i.e. previous recent owners and dealings etc since being transferred to the modern Torrens Title format. It may also include a copy of the original title or grant if the property has not been subdivided prior to being transferred to Torrens Title format.

This document may also be quite short and only go back a few years. This commonly occurs when a previous owner has subdivided a larger block with the block of interest to you being one of the new blocks formed by the subdivision. In these cases, near the upper left corner under the Volume and Folio number, you will often find a heading, 'Parent Title', with one or more Volume and Folio numbers. If there is only one repeat the purchase process using that Volume and Folio (V & F) number. As you have these numbers this time the next title will cost less.

If there are more than one set of numbers, you need to pick the one for the block in question. If there are a number of these parent titles that have similar or consecutive numbers try any odd one first. Also check to see if

the plan on the title references subdivision, sometimes the V & F numbers are written on it. It is at this stage where experience helps as it can become an art at this stage.


Keep tracing the parent title and eventually you will end up with the first title. In areas of previous mining such as Bendigo, many properties began as miner's rights and were not titled. They belonged to the Crown and were leased rather than owned. Many of these blocks will have a Crown Grant as the first 'title'. This may have occurred many years after the construction of a dwelling on the land under a Miner's Right- in fact the transfer to a Crown Grant in many cases occurred well into the 20th century, even up to the 1980s and 1990s. It is important to remember that this does not mean that the dwelling was moved onto the block in recent times. Each title will contain the dealings that have occurred on that title. For example, when a property is mortgaged, that mortgage is paid out, a caveat is taken over the land and transfers of ownership etc are all listed on the document. When a dealing causes a block to be divided, even by a small amount, this can cause the creation of a new parcel of land and hence a new Volume and Folio number, the old title

About PlanningAlerts

You'd probably know if your next-door neighbour was going to knock their house down (you'd get a letter through the door telling you they had applied for planning permission and asking you what you thought about it). But you'd probably never find out if the old cinema or pub 5 streets away is going to be converted into luxury flats until the bulldozers turned up.

<u>PlanningAlerts</u> is a free service which searches as many planning authority websites as it can find and emails you details of applications near you. The aim of this to enable shared scrutiny of what is being built (and <u>knocked down</u>) in peoples' communities.
