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

The building today

I've been a lover of all things old, forever, be it gardens, buildings, vehicles, people but all things historic. My first paid work was in the building sphere and the people I worked with were in love with old buildings. I started buying and renovating old buildings and I've been afflicted with that disease ever since. I watched the Beehive coming up for sale 10 years ago and staunchly directed myself never go inside. I'd heard descriptions of the interior, it's history and present state. I knew once I'd seen inside, I'd love it and I'd have to have it but that I'd definitely be biting off more than I could chew. So, I didn't go inside, I averted my eyes to the right on every drive past and was relieved to hear it had been sold.

Covid

Mid Covid I'd been looking at another historical building in town that was subsequently withdrawn from sale. The agent, however, whispered furtively that the Beehive might be available 'off market' Out of sheer curiosity and against my better judgement I agreed to have a look through. My fears were realised, and my passion ignited. It was a magnificent building with huge potential to be realised and brought back into circulation. To my great relief most of the hard yards of the restoration had been completed not only to a high standard but in such a way as to pay homage to the building's rich and varied past. Just a little finishing off, I convinced myself, a bit of dusting and a lick of paint here and there. Well of course here I am two years later with my duster and bailing twine still just finishing a few things off....



Things are happening

I'm very grateful that the Pall Mall Nominees certainly did the hard yards, I see my contribution completing their vision by bringing the building back to life and life back to the building. So, I've been working on sound, light, floor coverings, furnishings most importantly purpose and repopulation. There are three levels and both a front and rear to be considered. I'd like the large ground floor gallery to be used for just that, displays, exhibitions, functions and as an entertainment space. The first floor has a dozen small independent rooms that were the mining exchange offices. I'd like those rooms to be occupied by pervaders of passion, wine makers, distillers, condiment and confectioners, artists, sculptors, potters, jewellers, milliners, tailors; people who have a passion for what they do but lack an opportunity to share and present that to the community. There are two shops either side of the entrance from Pall Mall and I'd like these to be operated in collaboration with the emporium above, one may be a Provadore and the other display and sell craft items, ceramics, handmade jewellery, specialty garments and millinery.



The first floor has a ballroom at either end and the second floor another very large room. I intend to have these available for exhibitions, function and festival events such as The Book Week, The Writers Festival, collector groups, art exhibitions and film festivals. Bendigo and Central Victoria in general has a huge wealth of passionate creators and what we lack is a central precinct to support them.

It's taking some time but there's been good progress and we're not far off where we need to be.






Bendigo and District Branch Annual General Meeting Report 2024

The Branch elected a new committee at its AGM consisting of Peter Cox as President, Michael Lake as Secretary, Gary Hill as Treasurer, Peter Legg as Festival Coordinator and Jan Sonogan, Marg Hogan, Phil Howe and Peter Sheehan as committee members.

The President's report was circulated in the November newsletter with the main points being the Branch celebrating its 60th anniversary, continuing to respond to planning applications which are in conflict with heritage integrity, demolition by neglect issues and advocating for major historic buildings particularly along Pall Mall such as the Former Bendigo Law Courts and the Former Bendigo School of Mines buildings. The over development of the Bendigo Art Gallery site remains a major concern.

Correspondence

115 Lily Street Bendigo – Planning Application for a Medical Practice at the rear of a classic timber miner's cottage - from Michael Lake, architect and heritage enthusiast, California Gully.

It has been brought to my attention that a miner's cottage at 115 Lily Street Bendigo, on a L-shaped block of approximately 3200 sq metres extending to Rowan Street, is subject to a Planning Application for a Medical Centre.

The current proposal is to retain the front part of the timber cottage including the verandah and demolish the rear section and outbuilding. The existing timber building and proposed modest addition will be used for allied health services, document storage, and accommodation for visiting medical practitioners. The modern Medical Centre is proposed to be built at the rear of the site, extending towards the Rowan Street frontage, with carparking between the two buildings and under the Medical Centre. The proposed clinic will focus mainly on Urology which is in high demand in Bendigo.

The application states that the existing miner's cottage will be renovated to a high standard, in keeping with a professional medical practice. It is noted that several other heritage buildings, mainly former houses, have been converted to medical rooms in the vicinity of this site. The site is in the general vicinity of St John of God hospital and several other medical practices and consulting rooms.

The building designer's drawings illustrate minimal change to the streetscape along Lily Street, with only a glimpse of the modern building at the rear of the site. The new building is sensitively designed, encased in vertical timber battens to minimise impact from the street.

Overall, I have no objection to this development in a Heritage Overlay zone. Michael Lake

Branch discussion on the planning application - Peter Cox

Hundreds of similar planning applications have been approved by Council over many years. Medical centres are an accepted business activity in a residential zone but Council has the discretion to approve or reject them and if necessary, defend their decision at VCAT.

As a result of this type of application being approved hundreds of heritage properties throughout the City no longer have people living in them and the integrity of such properties has been eroded due to inappropriate over development, lost gardens in exchange for bitumen and car parking and inappropriate signage. In fact, this will be the second such application that Bendigo Urology has made over the past eighteen months with approval being given to one at 38 Myers Street Bendigo.

As a result of so many of these applications, the population in and around Bendigo CBD has decreased over the past ten years and population living close to the CBD is the lifeblood of business. You only need to go for a walk through the CBD to see the many empty buildings including heritage buildings. Businesses will only invest when they can see a vibrant City Centre. The CBD is an appropriate location for such a business.

It seems that there is a disconnect between planning policy and the issue of planning permits. Recently the Council adopted a policy of 70% as infill and 30% as greenfield development to grow much needed housing yet by issuing permits for such developments it allows for prime residential land to be used for business purposes. In 2021 the Council adopted a City Centre Plan which highlighted these issues but in the pursuing three years appears not to have done anything to change their actions. In this Medical Centre application, Council has an opportunity to better protect this heritage property, retain it for residential use and to encourage the applicant to develop the whole parcel of land for what it is zoned for. It just might start a discussion on how Council plans to retain and increase housing in Bendigo.



Be part of The Alchemy of Gold – A Unique Event in May 2025

Dear Friends,

We're excited to announce a special upcoming forum in May 2025 – **The Alchemy of Gold** - *the Golden Transformation of Victoria*, organised by local history and community groups Castlemaine Historical Society, Castlemaine Society, Maldon Museum, and Chewton Domain Society and the Pioneers and Old Residents Association. The forum contributes to the National Heritage Festival 2025.

This 3-day forum includes a lecture series with field trips and workshops which will explore how the gold rush of the 1850s transformed Victoria – socially, economically, environmentally, and politically – with impacts that still shape the state of Victoria today. The men and women of the gold rush fundamentally changed the social and political order of the then British military colony. These people initiated parliamentary democracy and began the modern industrial society we have today. The huge amount of gold produced transformed the Victorian economy and underpinned the international financial system, however the mining also devastated much of the land and waterways and resulted in the clearing of vast tracts of the box-ironbark forests. The gold rush drew thousands of people from around the world to Victoria, where they founded towns that still stand today — many of which continue to thrive, though in new and different ways. **The Alchemy of Gold** forum will explore how these changes played out, the impact the gold rush had on the First Nations people of the land and how the gold rush influenced the development of Victoria.

The Alchemy of Gold will take place at the Campbells Creek Community Centre from Friday, May 16 to Sunday, May 18, 2025, with a launch event at Castlemaine Art Museum on Thursday May 15 at 6pm.

Whether you're a history enthusiast or professional, or are curious about Victoria's transformation, there will be plenty of opportunities to learn, engage, and ask questions. Bendigo Cemetery Chapel restoration works complete

The Bendigo Cemetery Chapel has reopened after restoration works were completed. The reopening took place on 22 November 2024, with MP for Bendigo West Maree Edwards cutting the ribbon.

The Bendigo Cemetery Chapel was constructed in the Gothic style in 1873 from Harcourt granite. The restoration project was carried out using funds from a Heritage Victoria Living Heritage Grant and completed the conservation works that were needed to allow the chapel, which had been unused for several decades, to now be used regularly.

These works included addressing ongoing salt attack in the interior rendered walls and exterior pointing mortar. These repairs were carried out using renders and bedding mortars of traditional lime putty and washed sand under the direction of the heritage consultant. The original and early finishes to the interior walls were left untouched

where undamaged. More recent acrylic paint was removed by gentle scaping where flaking. Where it was still well attached, it was left to flake off over time. Due to the very porous nature of the original render using a paint stripper would have caused considerable damage to the original finish.

Accumulated bird droppings were removed from the roof trusses and the vents were re meshed. Repairs to the slate roof and flashings addressed leaks. The original timber doors were repaired and repainted in their original 19th century colours. Decorative cast iron faux door hinges were replicated where missing and reinstated, and appropriate door furniture was installed. Missing decorative columns on the buttresses were replicated.

By rectifying a number of serious issues the building had in the past, the owners Remembrance Parks Central Victoria, with the aid of the Cyclic Maintenance Report, produced as part of the project, will now be able to keep the building in good condition into the future. The inclusion of the drain behind the chapel has had a considerable effect in reducing erosion of graves and roadways around the area and keeping the soil below the floor dry.

There have been requests from the community for use of the chapel at the Bendigo Cemetery for some time for a number of purposes. These uses include a quiet reflective space out of the weather, a meeting space, conducting

small funerals, weddings etc and general small event space. The works, as well as the inclusion of power to the site, which was not part of the grant, has allowed the building to meet these community expectations. The building will be offered to community groups free of charge in some instances.

The complete project from providing assistance with the application for the grant and permits to completion of the works was managed by Dr Gary Hill of Minerva Heritage.



Wayne Evans, Remembrance Parks Central Victoria (RPCV) Director of Operations, worked closely with Dr Hill through the entire process. Dr Hill set the specifications and engaged the contractors who worked on the project and kept RPCV informed of progress and any issues that arose during the works. The works were carried out using only local tradespeople. In total eight local firms were engaged, several of whom had a number of employees. The project provided an opportunity for all involved to either practise skills they already had or learn new skills specific to heritage conservation works. An earlier round of works in 2018, also funded through Heritage Victoria's Living Heritage Grant Scheme, addressed repairs to the flèche, roof slates and floor.

The Bendigo Cemetery Chapel is listed on the Victorian Heritage Register (VHR 1614).

Did you know that Bendigo is the birthplace of women's cricket in Australia? The first women's cricket match occurred as part of the Easter Fair in 1874.


