Cover Story: Vale Peter Cox OAM Branch President 2018-2025 - Elaine Doling

Peter Cox achieved a great deal during his life, with the community always at the forefront of his actions.

He worked for the Melbourne YCW (Young Christian Workers) in the early 1970s and was the force behind the YCW campaign on Road Safety in Victoria following the many deaths of young people on Victorian roads. The campaign focussed on awareness of the failure to use seat belts and drink driving. This campaign was instrumental in bringing about compulsory wearing of seat belt legislation in Victoria. Many lives were saved as a result over the following years, with a reduction of 75% in road deaths.

Peter served as a Councillor in the Melbourne suburb of Hawthorn before moving to Bendigo with his family in 1985, where he founded a community at Kangaroo Flat based on YCW values of sustainability and co-operation. He established the Friends of the Forest Action Group, which became the Bendigo Environment Council. Moving to Eaglehawk 1989, he subsequently established Future Employment Opportunities, as well as the Eaglehawk Enterprise Park in 1990 and the Eaglehawk Recycle Shop in 1993. He was a founding member of Empowering Eaglehawk and a former president of the Rotary Club of Eaglehawk. He also established TradeStart to assist students at risk of leaving school by giving on the job training to keep them engaged. Peter was also heavily involved in the Eaglehawk Dahlia and Arts Festival. He was a Councillor for Eaglehawk Ward on the City of Greater Bendigo Council for eight years, serving as Mayor in 2014-15.


At this time, he stood up for his principles when far-right protesters from Sydney and Melbourne caused violent disruption in the council chamber and the streets over Council's decision to issue a permit for the building of a mosque. As Peter said "we held strong values that everybody was welcome to Bendigo and everyone had the right to practice their religion." He was also involved in the Bendigo Maubisse Friendship Committee which supports community development programmes in East Timor.

During his time as Councillor, Peter was Chair of Council's Heritage Advisory Committee for eight years. The Heritage Advisory Committee was started in 1984 when the late Andrew Ward was the City's first Heritage Advisor. The committee during this time had dedicated positions for the National Trust and the Bendigo Historical Society, as well as Heritage Victoria, and others, and meetings were attended by the Heritage Advisor. Peter was a very capable Chair and advocate for heritage conservation. In recognition of his outstanding service to the community, he was awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia in 2022.

Peter purchased the historic 1874 mud brick cottage *Hardhill* in Green Street, California Gully in 1998 Where he regularly held Open Days to raise funds, initially for the Maubisse Friendship Committee, and then a number of times for the National Trust. Most recently *Hardhill* was opened in May this year during the National Trust Heritage Festival.

He was actively involved in advocacy for causes as varied as the Bendigo Creek walking trail, preservation of miners' cottages, the former Bendigo Court House, Nanga Gnulle, and the Bendigo Art Gallery extension, among many others. He was also actively involved in organising the annual Heritage Festival. Early this year he expressed an interest in finding and relocating a small miner's cottage in danger of demolition to his garden to set up a miner's cottage museum. He actively continued his advocacy right up until his death, still writing the newsletter a week before he was admitted to palliative care. His energy and commitment to the preservation of our heritage will be long remembered.

Peter has left a lasting legacy, and the Branch will miss him.

I first met Peter Cox several years ago when I moved back to Eaglehawk after many years away. I was standing in my front yard when Peter came up to me, introduced himself as my local councillor and apologised for not having met me sooner! He asked if there was anything he could do for me, and I queried him about an odd shaped piece of ground in front of the house and was I allowed to plant anything there. The answer was that the land belonged to my house, but he would arrange something. The next day a gardener from council turned up and planted a crepe myrtle in said plot and the following day he came and planted a patch of agapanthus around the tree! I have never before or since come upon a councillor who worked so enthusiastically for his constituents. - Phil Howe

I met Peter in 2019. It was wonderful to be around him, and his enthusiasm was catching. We talked and talked, and I was happy to help out with Bendigo Branch activities, the online newsletter History & Heritage, as well as events for Heritage Festivals. Peter taught me so much about heritage overlays, the State Heritage Register, how planning permission worked, or didn't, and so on. Peter's passion for the city is demonstrated by his advocacy for the development of a master plan for Pall Mall. He recognised that without significant attention, some of its major assets such as the former Court House and the School of Mines could slide into serious disrepair. He encouraged the Bendigo Historical Society to highlight the former Law Courts in its most recent exhibition. He was determined to enable more Bendigonians to see inside the Law Courts and become



The City of Greater Bendigo is deeply saddened by the passing of former Mayor and Councillor Peter Cox OAM, who died peacefully at Bendigo Hospice on July 31, 2025, following a short battle with cancer. He was 76.

Peter served the Bendigo community with distinction, including as a Greater Bendigo Councillor from 2008 to 2016 and as Mayor from 2014 to 2015. His leadership was marked by a deep commitment to social justice, environmental sustainability, and grassroots community engagement.

A recipient of the Order of Australia Medal in 2022, Peter was widely respected for his tireless advocacy across a range of causes—from road safety and heritage preservation to employment and waste reduction. His legacy includes the development of the Eaglehawk Enterprise Park and Recycle Shop, and his role as President of the Bendigo branch of the National Trust, where he championed the protection of the region's rich history.

Mayor Cr Andrea Metcalf acknowledged Peter's legacy and service to Bendigo.

"Peter was a visionary leader and a passionate advocate for Bendigo. His contributions have left a lasting impact on our city and its people. We extend our heartfelt condolences to his family and loved ones," Cr Metcalf said.

State MP Maree Edwards has remembered former mayor Peter Cox OAM for his passion and persistence in everything he did. It comes after the ex-Bendigo councillor's death aged 76.

"Over many years, Peter and I worked together on a wide range of policies, projects and community issues," Bendigo West MP Ms Edwards said. "While we didn't always agree, our work was marked by mutual respect, robust debate and we always found common ground in our shared commitment to delivering for the people of Bendigo."

Mr Cox was mayor at the height of attimes vitriolic debates over a mosque for Bendigo and Ms Edwards praised him for his principled support for the project in the face of pressure from anti-mosque campaigners. "Peter's legacy is etched into the fabric of this city - Bendigo Historical Society, National Trust, Eaglehawk Recycle Shop, Enterprise Park, the Dahlia and Arts Festival, and his principled support for the Bendigo Mosque," she said.

Current mayor Cr Andrea Metcalf said his leadership was marked by a deep commitment to social justice, environmental sustainability, and grassroots community engagement.

"Peter was a visionary leader and a passionate advocate for Bendigo. His contributions have left a lasting impact on our city and its people. We extend our heartfelt condolences to his family and loved ones," she said.

A recipient of the Order of Australia Medal in 2022, Peter was widely respected for his tireless advocacy across a range of causes-from road safety and heritage preservation to employment and waste reduction.

Mr Cox's family described him as a social entrepreneur ahead of his time who championed causes like road safety and the environment, among other topics.

"A sincere thank-you to the wonderful staff who cared for him in his last month and all the people who enriched his well lived life," his loved ones said in a funeral notice.
