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Year in Review - Highlights and Achievements

1 Hobart Penitentiary - UNSHACKLED Experience

Winner at the Tasmanian Tourism awards and recently named Number 1 in the 2025 Traveller's Choice Best of the Best Awards. This honour places the Penitentiary in the top 1 per cent of experiences globally and at the top of the list for attractions across Australia and the South Pacific.

Clarendon's interior is given a brilliant face lift.

Paint specialist, Michael Bremer-Trainor, has reproduced the original colours in the upstairs bedrooms and dressing room of James and Eliza Cox. The ceiling in the dining room has also been returned to its original colour. Completed recently, these works were funded by a grant of \$44,000 from the Copland Foundation.

A major project to repair the Stables Block at Franklin House completed.

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For many years the interior of the Stables Block has been 'off-limits' and its external walls propped up by supports. With a grant from the State Government's Built Heritage Grants Scheme of \$176,000, the walls have been rebuilt along with other significant restoration to the interior.

Works underway to conserve and restore Nile Chapel, Deddington.

Important conservation works have recently started on the Nile Chapel, the burial place of colonial painter, John Glover, made possible by a State Government grant of \$90,000 through the Premier's Discretionary Fund. These works, with support from the local community trustees, will contribute to the Glover Country experience.

5 Substantial improvement in revenue from admissions.

Revenue from admissions has grown steadily in the 12-month period. UNSHACKLED: Hobart Penitentiary has delivered the largest increase in visitor numbers across the National Trust's property portfolio. Some 15,127 people have visited the site and these numbers are expected to grow in 2025 - 2026.

Collaboration with National Trust Australia.

We are a member of the national body representing each state and territory charged with advocating at the federal level for heritage funding and policy outcomes. Over 60,000 Australians belong to their National Trust, together with 3,700 volunteers and 735 staff. Our membership is enabling us to benefit from the experience of larger Trust organisations and to collaborate where we can on shared services.



Chair's Message

I am pleased to present the Annual Report 2024 - 2025 and Financial Statements.

This year has been one of resilience, growth, and renewed ambition for the National Trust.

We have welcomed hundreds of visitors back to our properties after several challenging years and strengthened our brand through award winning experiences like UNSHACKLED: Hobart Penitentiary.

We have made progress on critical conservation works at Clarendon, Franklin House, Nile Chapel and Penghana, both through grant funding and releasing some of our own limited resources. We have sought to strengthen our partnerships in the heritage and tourism sectors including, for example, with the Devonport City Council to realise the ambition for Home Hill's conservation and future use.

Looking ahead, the Trust faces some key challenges. Like many organisations in the heritage sector, we face the rising costs of conservation, reliance on volunteers and fundraising and the need to find new sources of funding.

Our strategic goals are changing. We have the evidence from the Stennings Report and Heritage Tasmania visitor data that growth in heritage tourism has the potential to provide further economic and social benefits for Tasmania. We are strengthening our partnerships and collaboration across the heritage and tourism sector, including to support development of new heritage tourism experiences. This could include convict-based tourism involving sites managed by the Trust, the Port Arthur Historic Site Management Authority and Parks Tasmania.

Government support is most needed in partnership development, product development and marketing. The development of UNSHACKLED: Hobart Penitentiary is a model for government investment in new heritage tourism experiences.

Heritage is Tasmania's story. And the National Trust wants to ensure that story is told, preserved and shared. We want to be able to do more than survive, we want the organisation to thrive. That means we must be successful in attracting new and stable funding and strengthening our capacity to inspire and educate future generations. We see the opportunities to increase our audiences, to gain new supporters and to help position heritage as central to Tasmania's tourism and cultural identity.

I would like to thank the Minister for Heritage, the Hon Madeleine Ogilvie MP, and her staff for the support they have given to the Trust. I would also like to acknowledge the productive and professional relationships with Heritage Tasmania, Tourism Tasmania, Port Arthur Historic Site Management Authority and other government and non-government organisations in the heritage and tourism sectors.

As I leave the Board after six years, I would like to acknowledge the extraordinary support I have received from my Board colleagues. I admire their dedication and their resilience. In particular, I would like to thank Jude Franks, who together with her role as Deputy Chair, has acted as the Managing Director since late January 2025. I also wish to acknowledge the staff and volunteers whose passion and commitment for their roles is an inspiration.

If you have a spare half or full day a fortnight or know someone who would enjoy being part of a social hub, please let us know.










Volunteers by Property

Membership is critical to underpinning our success.



Future Opportunities & Challenges



While we are continuing to increase our own revenue, particularly from admissions, the Trust continues to depend on the State Government's annual operating grant of \$312,325 which has remained at the same level for some years. This grant helps to meet our staff costs, insurance and utility costs across our property portfolio.

We also rely on State Government support through the **Built Heritage Grants Scheme** for essential conservation and maintenance works. This Scheme is a vital investment in Tasmania's built heritage and the Trust is a strong advocate for its continuation.

There is an expectation from government that the Trust become more financially sustainable. Our current approach is to build recurrent revenue from admissions, while relying on State and Federal grants for maintenance works.

We are exploring opportunities to diversify revenue through events, retail, the adaptive reuse of buildings, and partnerships with other organisations in the sector, including for example the management of our collections. We are also trying to build fundraising, including through signature events in the North and South of the State, philanthropy and private sector support.







Clarendon Estate

Significant conservation works were completed at Clarendon Estate, thanks to the generous support of the **Copland Foundation.** Heritage colour consultant, Michael Bremer-Trainor, led the project, which focused on restoring upstairs bedrooms, dressing room and the grand dining room to their historically accurate finishes.

The bedrooms were repainted in authentic heritage colours, carefully chosen based on detailed paint scrapings taken from the original layers. This method ensured the new finishes honour the estate's historic integrity, bringing these elegant spaces closer to their 19th-century appearance.

In the magnificent dining room, scrapings from the ornate ceiling curiously uncovered a beautiful dusky pink—a surprising and delicate hue with very few overpainting layers, suggesting it may be one of the room's earliest colour schemes.

We are thrilled to be revealing these rooms in their former glory—not only to enhance the visitor experience and storytelling of Clarendon's rich past, but also to explore the estate's potential as a heritage filming location.



Franklin House

We are delighted at the completion of the stable restoration project at Franklin House, made possible with support from the State Government **Built Heritage Grants Scheme.**

Franklin House, the first property acquired by the National Trust of Australia (Tasmania) in 1960, was built in 1838 for former convict Britton Jones and stands as a rare example of Georgian architecture. The property later served as a private school and is now preserved as a museum and heritage site.


Martyn Jordan from Heritage Restoration Tasmania undertook the project, which carefully preserved and stabilised the historic stables. This project has ensured their long-term conservation and reinforced the Trust's commitment to protecting Tasmania's heritage for future generations.


